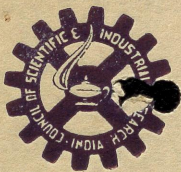

Dear Shri Agarwala,

With reference to your D.O.No.7(1)10/62-EI, dated 16-10-1963, I will be glad if you would kindly take up the matter with the Secretary and seek his advice regarding a more generous interpretation of the rules.

I do not wish to go back ^{on} the history, excepting to mention that I have not taken more than 18 days' earned leave during the entire period of my service of more than 15 years. I would have been entitled to at least 4 months of refused leave if I had applied for it ^{at} ~~en~~ time. It was only during the month of August, 1963 that I applied for leave and I got a refused period of about 32 days.

I did not actually retire on 15th September. My term of appointment was continued and, as things stand, it will expire on 31st October, 1963, if the new Director joins on 1st November, 1963. If he does not join on that day, I will have to continue for some more days. In any case, there is a prima facie case for treating the additional period of service as one for which leave has been refused to me.

In a matter of this type, it is for the authorities of the Council to give a generous interpretation. I have personally no objection to your insisting on the interpretation given in the letter under reference, but in consideration of the circumstances stated above and whatever service that I have rendered to the Council, I would appreciate a more generous interpretation.

Our Secretary, Shri A.J.Kidwai, is well acquainted with ^{some of} the difficulties that I have ^{been} suddenly faced with. With that as the background, it would be most helpful if you and the Secretary could find a way of treating the entire period commencing from 15th August, 1963 till the date of my handing over charge to my successor as a period of refused leave. The Council has been known to be generous in other cases and I hope that such a consideration will not be refused in my case.

With reference to the above, I wish to submit that the terms and conditions are considerably different from those conveyed to me by the Director-General when he spoke to me about the subject. I would feel thankful for kind early clarification in respect of the following. The office of the Institute may also like to clear directives in respect of some of the points.

1 It is stated that the appointment will take effect from the date on which Dr. Parpia took over charge as the Director of this Institute.

Dr. Parpia took charge on 4th of November, 1963. Since that date, I have been on refused leave as already sanctioned to me by the Council. There is a further recommendation that the Council may be pleased to sanction the earned leave for a total period of four months.

Does it mean that during the period covered by my refused leave, I may also draw my honararium as Emeritus Scientist?

2 The Director-General had advised me that I will have the option of working at any research centre, where I may get the required facilities. Dear Dr. Subrahmanyam,

Will you kindly refer to your D.O. letters (1) FT/COUN/1/63-23 dated 21/22-11-1963, (2) FT/COUN/1/63-16 dated 19-11-1963 and (3) FT/COUN/1/63-40 dated 2.12.1963 addressed to Director-General & Secretary?

The questions regarding your appointment as Professor Emeritus, grant of 4 months leave as 'refused leave' and employment in NIH Project have been considered and it has been decided as under:-

(1) Appointment as Professor Emeritus:

Orders regarding your appointment as Emeritus Scientist at an honorarium of Rs.1,000/- p.m. have already been issued to you. The position has also been clarified to you by Shri A.J. Kidwai, Secretary in his D.O. letter of even number dated 23.11.1963.

(2) Grant of 4 months leave as a 'Refused Leave' or ex-gratia payment for six months:

You had applied for 32 days earned leave with effect from 14.8.1963 preparatory to retirement, vide your application dated 5th August, 1963. This was refused and you were allowed to avail this leave after your retirement i.e. after 15.9.1963. But since you had to continue in service till 4.11.1963 (F.N.), your entitlement become for 4 more days which were earned by you on the extended period of service. Accordingly, we have issued orders for grant of 36 days refused leave to you.

Your present request for grant of 4 months refused leave or ex-gratia payment for 6 months is not tenable. The case of Dr. Whitaker, Ex-Director, CMIS which you have referred to, was quite different. He, being a temporary Council servant, was allowed terminal leave of 180 days which was due to him and which was applied for by him well in time.

(3) Employment in NIH Project:

It is regretted, it is not possible to give you a regular appointment in the N.I.H. Project at this stage. Your appointment as Emeritus Scientist should afford you sufficient opportunity to have association with NIH Project.

I hope, I have clarified all the points raised by you.

Dear Shri Agarwala,

Many thanks for your D.O.No.7(1)10/63-EI dated 27.12.1963. Your letter was presumably written before you received the representation that I have submitted to the Vice-President on the subject of my refused leave.

- 1 Appointment as Emeritus Scientist : I have already received the official communication and further clarification as conveyed in your letter No.16(46)/63-EI dated 17.12.1963.
- 2 Refused Leave : In my further representation, as submitted to the Vice-President, I have not claimed leave for any extra period as a matter of right. I have frankly stated that I had misjudged the position and made the mistake of not submitting the application at the proper time. I have stated that I would not have got the leave preparatory to retirement, even if I had applied for it at an earlier date, because I had to continue not only upto the end of the sanctioned term, but also for a further period of about 7 weeks at the request of the Council. The application that I have submitted has been forwarded by the Director of this Institute who has also cited the related rules to support my case.

You will see, therefore, that the matter is still sub-judice and that if the Council supports my case on the basis of known facts, the Vice-President may take a generous view and condone the lapse on my part. My only mistake lay in not applying at the right time. I hope, that after all these years of service during which I took practically no earned leave, I will not be penalised for having failed to apply at the right time. If the Council recognises that I would have been normally entitled to it, my case will be adequately strengthened.

3 Employment in the NIH Project :

I had made the enquiry on the basis of recent action taken by the Director-General himself. I expect that, by this time, some thing concrete would have been heard from the NIH Authorities. There is also the historical fact that, right upto some date in October, 1963, I had acted on the basis of the Director-General's written advice that I would be in charge of the Project, even after retirement.

I have no doubt that the Director-General himself will kindly appreciate that I have a strong moral case. If I had joined the Project even during August or September, 1963, the whole picture would have been different from what is today.

With further reference to the above, I have already received the authorisation for booking my tickets (through T.W.A.) from Bangalore to Washington and back. The American authorities have given me the discretion to make such additions and alterations as I may like by paying the difference.

The Director-General has already agreed and I have also written to you stating that I will

- 1) make halts at Beirut, Rome and London on the way
- and ii) spend about 6 weeks visiting leading Centres in U.S.A. before visiting returning to India.

My itinerary in the States will take me from the East to West coast in U.S.A., a distance of about 3,000 miles. I can cover this distance as a part of my return journey by paying the difference (about Rs 670/-) if I can travel from the west coast by the pacific route. On the other hand, it will cost me much more if I have to travel back to New York from place like Seattle. Moreover, with a round-the World ticket, I can travel from Los Angeles to Seattle (a distance/ about 1,500 miles) without any extra charge.

In view of the above, I request that the sanction, as conveyed to me, may cover the following :

- i) the stop-overs at Beirut, Rome and London which will not involve any extra cost ;
- ii) my visits to different research Centres in the States and paying for the difference in fare in rupees ;

When I met Shri Agarwala in his office on 10.4.64, he was kind enough to advise me that the necessary official sanction with clearance from the concerned Ministries, will be conveyed within about a week. He also assured me that my pass-port, with the endorsements, will also be sent to me at the same time.

Till this date, neither of these has arrived. I have not also had any acknowledgment to my letters and telegrams.

I have already received the authorisation for my air passage from Bangalore to Washington and back. I cannot, however, make any firm booking until I get the formal clearance and my pass-port with the necessary endorsements.

I am planning to leave ^{Mysore} in less than a fortnight. I have to make halts on the way - in Beirut, Rome and London - and they will cover about 10 days. The travel, with waiting for the connecting services, will take at least 3 days. I have to be in Washington on 23.5.1964. You will see, therefore, that I will have to leave Mysore by about the 10th of May.

I applied to the Council and got the D.G.'s concurrence as early as February, 1964. We are now nearing the end of April. There was no need for so much delay over such an issue. More expeditious action, with personal contacts, could have got things through in less than a month. I have known cases of people getting their clearance in less than a week.

Anyway, if I do not hear definitely from you - preferably by telegram - or receive the papers and pass-port before 1.5.1964, I will have to undertake a journey to Delhi and stay there till all the papers are handed over to me. The D.G. has already authorised me to undertake journeys as and when I consider them to be necessary.

On previous occasions, the communications referred
to the Vice-President's sanction and the concurrence of
the concerned Ministries. Copies were also sent to the
Reserve Bank at Madras, which is the nearest office for
authorising the issue of plane tickets. Such a communication
has not yet been received by me.

By today's post, I received Shri Agarwala's letter
of 30.4.64 which deals with the later correspondence relating
to my visits within U.S.A. and my paying the difference for
a round-trip (with return via Pacific) so as to avoid extra
expenditure on travel from the West to the East Coast of
U.S.A. I do not know whether such a letter will be accepted
by the Reserve Bank as being sufficient authority for permit-
ting me to pay the difference in fare in rupees.

As the American organization has authorised Messrs
Trans World Airlines to issue my tickets, I have arranged to
be in Madras on 5th May to finalise the bookings. If that


