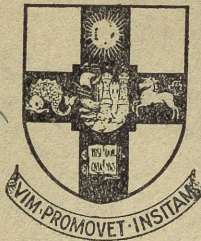

Dear Professor Krishnan,

I received your paper, and am sending it to the Royal Society. Probably they will then send it to me to referee and I will let you know if I have any comments.

With regard to Dr.Bhatia, I have found during this last session that I have more research students than I can properly look after and next session I am already committed to even more. That means that if Dr.Bhatia came here, it would be physically impossible for me to give him very much time, and he would work mainly with one of my colleagues. Another difficulty is that we have the greatest difficulty in getting desks for our research people to sit at. I thought it only fair to explain to you the difficulties in case Dr.Bhatia should be awarded the 1851. It would be much better if he could come in the year afterwards.

I also wanted to ask your opinion on Mr.H.C.Bhuyan. Mr.Bhuyan arrived here last February, having come from Calcutta, and asked to be taken on in our research school. We knew nothing about him. He had no testimonials, but said he had worked with you for one summer vacation. I told him that he could stay until the end of the summer, so that we could find out what his abilities were. If you know anything about him, or have any advice to offer, I would be most glad if you would let me know. If we keep him, it will, of course, occupy a place which might be available to someone much better qualified, such as your student, Dr.Bhatia.
