I, therefore, regret I shall not be able to take any students for research till then. I beg to introduce myself as the above-named person whom in 1942 March you protected with both your hands in Nagpur at B.Sc (Hons) (Physics) exam. Though your generosity was profound, my days were bad; so I had to appear at B.Sc (Pass) in 1944. I secured a I class there. I am not an M.Sc however. I passed Section A (5 papers) of AMJEE (dond) in April 1946; sat at Section B (2 papers) last April & am awaiting results from England. My Special Subject in AMJEE is "Electricity Supply" (Generation & Transmission).

Dr. Ganesan told me (after my B.Sc) that I had the honour of approaching you straight (even without a letter of introduction from him) and proceed with research under your guidance. But people at home were more cruel with me (and are so even today) than the Nagpur people. So I could not even pay my respects to you personally then.

I have no one to look to except your noble self in whom I have placed all my hopes in life. Shall I go down then? It can never be. Misfortune has not impaired my energies to channelise which I eagerly look to your inspiration, whether by way of research in your Institute or by way of service to it in a regular post however humble it may be; because either way fetches me honour and prospect.

I live on your generosity - as before once. And if by way of reply, I am privileged to receive word of hope in any of the two directions above in the Institute at Delhi, then once more I should have come back to life.

My faith is not misplaced.
