convenient. There is no hurry about
it from the patient's point of view
But she feels that if you come
she would feel better. That is
the position.

From the medical point of view
we do not know the cause of this disease
nor do we have any specific remedy
for it. But the disease often gets
better itself & is likely to relapse
after an variable interval. His
condition is not bad now. The
eye is affected & he sees double
and he has weakness of his hands
& legs. Causing ^{Soul} difficulty in using
these. Otherwise he ~~is~~ all right.

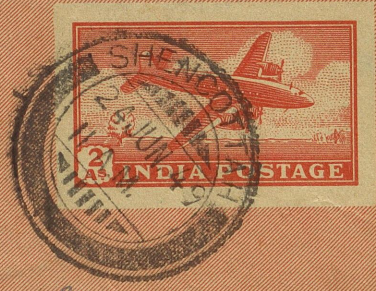
