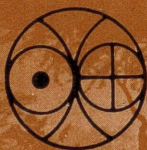

INDIAN ACADEMY OF SCIENCES

The Indian Academy of Sciences was founded in 1934 by the late Professor Sir C. V. Raman, with the objective of promoting the progress and upholding the cause of science (pure and applied) by, inter alia, publishing the results of important scientific researches through its journals, proceedings and transactions; publishing books, memoirs, reviews, etc., on scientific subjects; undertaking and directing scientific enterprises of an all-India significance; organising scientific discussions through congresses, conferences, symposia, seminars etc., and securing and administering funds, grants and endowments for furtherance of scientific research. It was registered as a Society under the Societies Registration Act in April 1934.

The Academy comprises Fellows, Honorary Fellows and Associates. The General Body of Fellows sets limits to its size from time to time and regulates the annual intake of new Fellows by election through a system of postal ballots. The annual intake is normally limited to 20 for Fellows and 3 for Honorary Fellows. At present there are about 660 Fellows, 50 Honorary Fellows and 40 Associates on roll.

At a practical level, the Academy maintains information on the spread of the interest of its Fellows amongst the following scientific areas :

Mathematical Sciences

(including statistics and demography)

Physics

(Theoretical, experimental and applied, including Astronomy and Astrophysics)

Chemistry

(Inorganic, organic, physical and applied)

Engineering and Technology

(including electronics, computer sciences and metallurgy)

Medicine

Earth and Planetary Sciences

(including meteorology)

Animal Sciences

Plant Sciences, and

General Biology

The Academy has a self-governing system, the elements of which are the Fellows forming the general body, the Council and the President. The Council of 20 is presided over by the President and has 4 Vice Presidents, 2 Secretaries, a Treasurer, an Editor of Publications, and 11 other members. The Council is reconstituted every three years by election of its members through postal ballot. It is the executive body which administers the affairs and all the properties of the Academy vest with the Council.

The President is the Chairman of the Council and of the General Body of Fellows. Professor Sir C. V. Raman was the Founder President. Professor R. Narasimha is currently the President from 1992.

The publication activity occupies the pride of place amongst all the activities of the Academy and is of a pioneering nature. Starting with the Proceedings in 1934, it has over the last five decades, considerably expanded this activity. The Proceedings have been split up theme-wise. Publication of new journals like Pramana-Journal of Physics has been undertaken. The following is the list of its present publications, the annual output of which now aggregates to approximately 7000 pages.

Current Science is published by the Current Science Association in collaboration with the academy. This multidisciplinary fortnightly journal, published since 1932, has the highest impact index and circulation among all the scientific journals in the country.

The Annual Meeting of the Academy, which is held each year at a different location, largely at major educational centres and universities, also serves to bring the Fellows resident in different parts of India in personal contact with each other and with the local scientific community and enables them to exchange ideas on subjects of common interest. At these meetings, the President delivers his inaugural address which invariably deals with some scientific topic relating to his own researches. The scientific programme of the Annual Meetings normally includes symposia and discussion sessions, lecture presentations by Fellows and Associates and evening lecture on popular topics. It is the desire of the Academy that its Annual Meeting should be a major opportunity for participation of a large number of scientists, teachers and students, particularly of the younger generation as well as the public of the area where meeting is held.

In addition, there is also a mid-year Annual Meeting in Bangalore which provides opportunities to a larger number of new Fellows and Associates to

deliver lectures.

To commemorate the work and memory of Prof. C. V. Raman, the Government of India instituted a "Raman Chair" by creating an endowment in the Academy in 1972. Distinguished scientists from India and abroad are invited to occupy the Chair as "Raman Professor" for periods ranging from 3 to 6 months lecturing and interacting with scientists in the country. The academy values such visits and especially the opportunity afforded to our younger scientists working in different institutions to come into contact with these eminent scientists. It is also possible to have a few younger scientists attached to the Raman Professor during the period he occupies the Chair.

The "Academy Lectures" and "Discussion Meetings" are two other activities of the Academy. Under the former, distinguished scientists (Indian and Foreign) are invited to deliver lectures at Bangalore or elsewhere. Under the latter, specific subjects of current topical interest are chosen and discussion meetings arranged. These feature a limited number of talks by experts, followed by practically an unlimited discussion period. The proceedings of these discussions are normally published by the Academy.

In 1943, the Academy established a prestigious research institution – the "Raman Research Institute" at Bangalore. This institute is today an independent, autonomous research institute of repute and functions under a public charitable trust, created in 1971.

The finances of the Academy are derived largely from grants from the Department of Science and Technology, Government of India, other central and state government sources, universities, research institutions, etc., as well as subscriptions to its journals, Fellowship dues and income from endowments.

This year the 58th Annual Meeting of the Academy will be held at the Physical Research Laboratory and Space Applications Centre, Ahmedabad on 6 - 9 November.

SCIENTIFIC PROGRAMME

The Scientific Programme comprises of invited lectures and contributory papers. In case all the contributory papers cannot be accommodated in the slide presentation sessions they will be allocated to poster sessions. Selection of the papers for the type of presentation shall be largely based on the scheduling constraints and in no way reflect on the quality of work. The time allotted for invited talk and contributory paper is 30 minutes and 10 minutes respectively. One afternoon session is arranged exclusively for poster presentations.

PARTICIPATION

The Conference is open to professionals such as geneticists, anthropologists, paediatricians, obstetricians, biochemists, molecular biologists, cytologists, physicians and others who are interested in human genetics, anthropology and environment.

ABSTRACTS

Participants are requested to send the abstracts of their papers (not exceeding 200 words) in duplicate to the Secretary-General along with the registration fee on or before 30th September, 1992. Abstracts received after this date may not be accepted. Only registered delegates will be intimated about the date and time and mode of presentation of papers by 20th November, 1992. In case no intimation is received by this date, authors are requested to write to the Secretary immediately. Abstracts received without registration fee will not be printed in the "Abstracts Volume".

The paper should have summary, introduction, materials and methods, results, discussion and references. References should be cited in the text by authors' names and year. References at the end of the text should be listed alphabetically by author's name, year of publication, title of the paper, name of journal, volume number and page number. Reference to books should include names of editors,

publishers, place of publication, volume and page numbers. The papers will be scrutinized and edited by the editorial board, if necessary and only those articles recommended will be included in the proceedings.

Participants must make their own arrangements for travel grants.

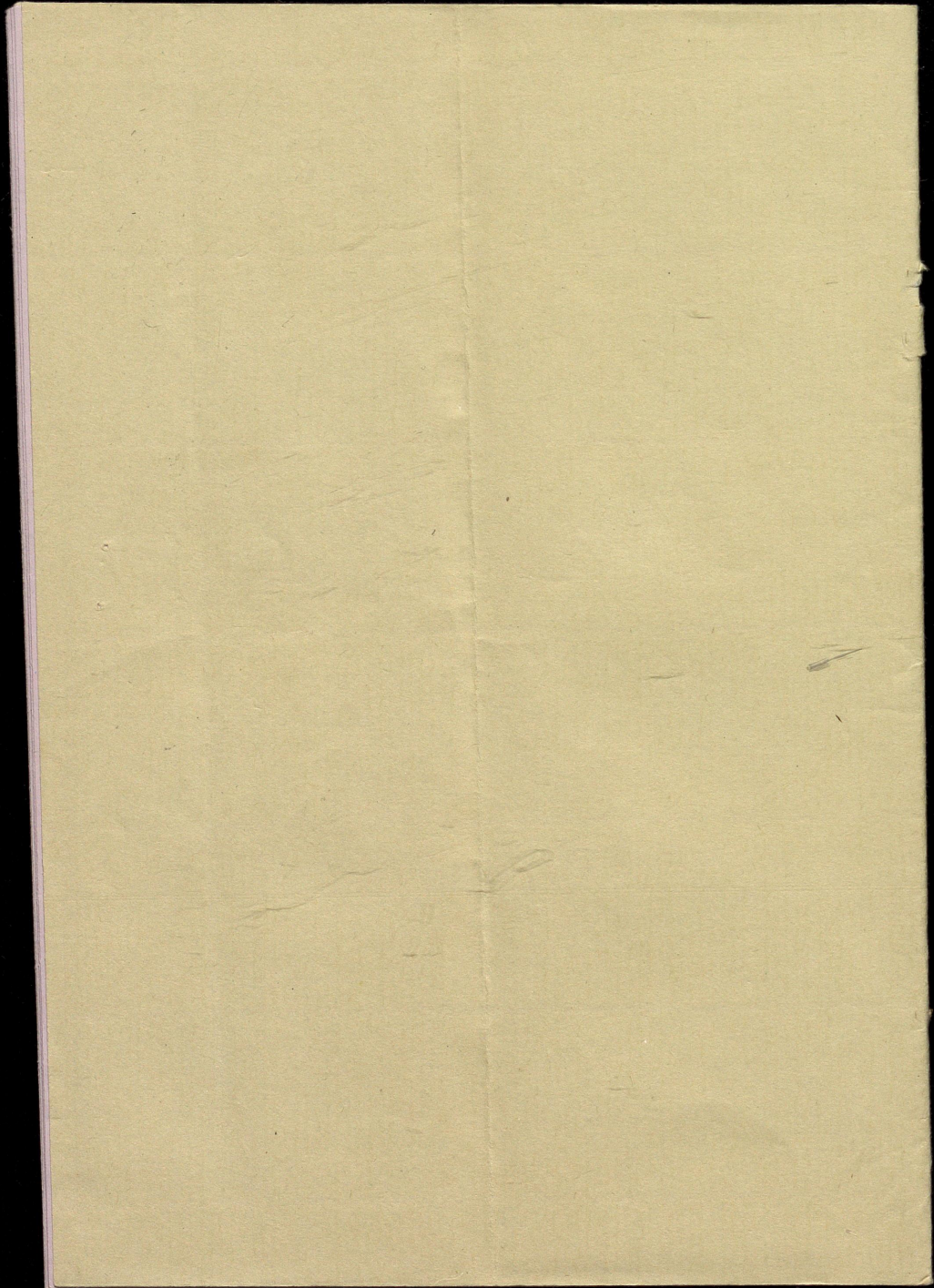

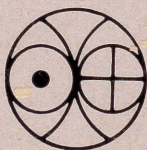

Cultural Evening of Kathak Dances by Kadamb



Kadamb was started in March 1967 with the major objectives of promoting and propagating of Kathak Dance. Kadamb is the only institution for Kathak dance in this part of the country. It has successfully propagated a healthy interest and understanding of this dance form in the State of Gujarat where Kathak was a less known form before.

Kadamb runs a training unit which imparts teaching in Kathak dance, music and associated subjects of Tabla, Yoga and stage-craft. A number of students trained at Kadamb are now professional dancers in their own right. They have taken part in a number of festivals, competitions, concerts, seminars, conferences and public performances. They have gained a reputation amongst critics and audiences for their virtuosity, discipline and presentation. This group has given a number of performances in India at major Dance Festivals and other concerts.

A brief account of dances to be performed during the 58th Annual Meeting of the Indian Academy of Sciences follows.

SHRAVAN...

Means 'hearing'. Man's ability to hear offers a variety of experiences thereby influencing him in his relationship to nature, people and his environment.

ATAH KIM...

All our traditional art forms were an expressions of the people's sense of a spiritual reality behind the appearance of MAYA, but that sense is fast vanishing and we are giving ourselves up to the pursuit of wealth and power symbolised by the golden disc of the prayer in the 'Ishopanishad I', an ancient Indian testament, which is the overture of the musical score of this number, meaning 'the face of truth is covered with a brilliant golden disc, that do thou remove, Oh Sun God, so that my eyes may see the truth of Dharma'.

This frenzed struggle for the material in life is producing a deep sense of frustration and the artist is as much perplexed by the spiritual emptiness of the present day life as anybody else. Therefore, the problem for all of us is ATAH-KIM (where do we go from here).

Lothal



Situated 84 kms south of Ahmedabad the excavation of the ancient city of Lothal has not only added more years to Gujarat's past but it has also managed to alter the accepted territories of the Indus Valley Civilisation. The period of Lothal is supposed to be from 2450 to 1900 B.C. and it was discovered in 1954. Lothal means 'the hill of dead man'. The

archaeological excavations have shown that the town-planning was superb. Big buildings, bath-rooms, the drainage system, factories, godowns, marketing place and roads were planned and built quite systematically. The ruins indicate that Lothal was a prosperous port and a trade centre in ancient times. The Lothal Dock, a brick structure about 710 ft by 116 ft, the wall rising to a height of around 10 ft, is the most significant discovery at Lothal. A number of coins, idols, ornaments, vessels and human skeletons have been found during the excavation. Everything has been preserved in a museum.

It is believed that Lothal was devastated by heavy floods in 2350 B.C., exactly a hundred years after it was inhabited. Then some genius again planned the town on a hillside covering it with a tall and strong wall. The facilities for anchoring of vessels were built afresh.

The utensils found from Lothal were made of clay, stone, bronze, etc. They were decorated with fine carvings. The human figures are also seen on some of them. Some of the diagrams and pictures have a mixed character, a human body with an animal head. The picture of a bull is frequently seen. That shows that Lothal must have been a city of artists and craftsmen. The people of Lothal might have been very much fond of ornaments too.

The crematorium was located on a hill outside the wall of the town. A few skeletons have been found there. A copper ear-ring was seen on a skeleton. Another skeleton had sea-shell bangles on hands. This means that the people of Lothal might have followed the custom of burying the dead. Twin skeletons were also excavated at one place. Most of the skeletons indicated that the age of the buried person was not more than thirty years and not less than twenty years. A question may arise whether the aged were cremated or buried. It is a matter of research.

The excavations at Lothal help fill an important gap in Indian History to the periods between the mid 2nd and 1st millenium B.C.
