ANNUAL REPORT 1942-43

COLLEGE DEPARTMENT

I HAVE the honour to place before you and before this distinguished gathering the report on the working of the College for the academic year 1942-43.

Strength and Attendance

It has become customary for the last five or six years regularly to report an increase in strength of well over a hundred a year, and the period under review makes no exception to the rule; on the contrary the rise has been greater than in the previous years, with the result that our numbers are at present more than double what they were, less than ten years ago; the report of 1935-36 speaks of 802 students on the rolls in March 1936. In March 1943 there were on the rolls 1720 students. This great increase in numbers last year must however be attributed to the very exceptional and transient circumstances under which the admissions were made. In March 1942 the City Colleges had closed much earlier for fear of an enemy attempt against the harbour, and it was a foregone conclusion that the students on the advice of their parents would, at the time of the reopening seek for greater safety in the Moffusil centres. The fact that the increase in strength was evenly spread over all the classes, Senior as well as Junior, together with the fact that several of those refugee students returned later on to the city, is sufficient proof that panic had much to do with the prosperity which the Moffusil Colleges were enjoying or enduring.

If the year was thus exceptional with regard to the admissions it was scarcely less so as regards discipline and attendance. A wave of dissatisfaction and unrest was sweeping over the land, and it was not to be expected that the young would keep aloof. Though we had hopes at a time, that our tradition of close and friendly co-operation between the authorities and the students would keep us from harm, the excitement proved too strong and we also had the

very doubtful honour of seeing the name of our College in print, an honour which, it is hoped, the loyalty and good sense of our students will spare us in future. The attendance naturally reflects the troubles through which we were passing; it has fallen to 92 per cent. Perhaps it might be argued that, since the University requires only 75 per cent from each individual student, 92 per cent remains creditable enough. But in fact the figure means that on an average, there were about 140 students absent for at least one class every day. Looked at in this light the figure is much less satisfactory, chiefly when we remember that we have so many boarders and Hostel students who can, and in fact do, fairly easily secure full attendance. On this point perhaps a more ready co-operation on the part of the parents would be desirable; not all the leave letters which they sign find favour in the eyes of the Vice-Principal.

have The year was exceptional not only with regard to admissions and discipline, but in other respects as well. Rarely, I imagine, must so many and so important changes have been confined within such a short space of time. We began the year with a new Rector, a new Principal, a new Vice-Principal and a new head of the English department, changes enough indeed to satisfy the most enthusiastic reformer, enough also to perturb any lover of the old order. Three men shared the main work which our former Rector

and Principal Rev. Fr. J. D'Souza S.J. managed single-handed, besides many other side lines, and the best tribute to his energy and achievement is the proud astonishment with which old students look at the stately buildings, which seem to have suddenly sprung out of the earth, on the extensive grounds where they had known but green fields. In Rev. Fr. Siqueira we lost an educationist of wide renown, an outstanding professor of English, an experienced and beloved warden. However, both left us only to take up still more responsible work in our sister colleges, and our loss was a gain to others. Not so when towards the middle of the year death took away from us Sri Natesa Mudaliar, our popular and revered Tamil Pandit. Not only did we lose in him a well beloved master, a sincere and most devoted friend of the Institution but the whole country lost a great Tamil scholar, a great patriot and "a true gentlemen." Sri T. Ayyamperumal Konar and Sri T. K. Kuppuswami Alwar, Senior Pandits in the School Department were called upon to fill the vacancy till the end of the year.

Towards the end of the third term Mr. P. E. Subrahmanyam who had served the College ever since he left the portals of the University some 35 years ago, tendered in his resignation. He had given the best of his life and energies to the service of the college, and much of the reputation which the Physics Department enjoys is due to his untiring efforts and devotion to the cause of science. We are happy to be able to profit by this occasion to give thus public expression to our sentiments of deep gratitude for his long and devoted services.

The increase in the number of students made the appointment of additional tutors imperative: Messrs. S Rangaswami and Jesudoss Chelliah were added to the English Staff, T. G. Pranatharthiharan to the Mathematics Department, V. K. Lonappan and P. S. Ramachandran to the Chemistry Department and S. A. Lobo to the History Staff.

Mr. K. Swaminathan was called upon to help the English Lecturers and Rev. Fr. H. Audrain S. J. to take over half the French classes.

Results

As was to be expected the results have been less brilliant than in the previous years, though still very satisfactory on the whole. In Intermediate we sent up the record number of 362 students of which 217 i. e. 60% passed fully with 91 first classes, as compared with the 69% and the 100 first classes of last year. The falling off

in passes must chiefly be attributed to the unexpectedly low percentage in the history group, where it is useless to pretend that we have maintained our usual standard. As the classes grow in strength it becomes increasingly difficult to give to each the individual attention needed to assure the success of the less brilliant or more indolent student, and a falling off in the high percentage becomes almost unavoidable.

In the Honours classes, on the other hand our results were more brilliant than usual. Last year we noted a slight falling off in the B. Sc. Honours, which has been made up this year to an extent which would seem almost too good, did we not remember that the brightest students in the Presidency are gathered in that class. Out of 19 students in the class 16 secured a first class with the first in the Presidency at their head. In Economics also we secured the first in the Presidency, with four first classes and ten second classes. In Mathematics Honours we have to be satisfied with the Second rank, but the student secures the Prizes and one of our M. A. candidates stands first. In B. Sc. and B. A. Pass the results are less satisfactory. Instead of the 80 to 90 per cent which was the rule in previous years we have to be satisfied with a poorer, though still honourable 75 per cent. It is a consolation of a sort to us, to know that we stand high above the Presidency average in Physics, but I fear it is no consolation whatever to the students who have to appear again very shortly. Perhaps they had all grown too confident of success and a set back may be a blessing in disguise. The B. A. Pass with only 43 per cent of full passes is below our usual standard. On the other hand we note with special pleasure that our English Preliminary, with 79 per cent passes has practically reached "that almost unflinching 80 per cent of former years" which must remain our goal.

It may perhaps be thought that undue stress is being laid every year on the results; we know quite well that good results are not the sole, perhaps not even the main consideration but unless they are present there may be at least a suspicion that the other aims are missed as well.

A more spacious Library with a more commodious reading room would be a great encouragement in that direction, but in the meantime we have to be satisfied with what we can afford, and even at present it should be possible to spend in the reference room, a pleasant and useful half hour not necessarily wasted in idle talk.

Sports and Games

Our players and sportsmen have been very much in the lime light during the year. They annexed

iii. The Team Championship Cup and a number of Prizes at the Pudukotta Dussra sports where D. Natesan struck great form and won the individual championship Cup.

iv. The Father Bertram Memorial Shields for Volleyball and Basketball tournaments held in the Loyola College, Madras.

This is indeed a creditable record and in a way a compensation for what our teams had hoped to win in the University inter-Collegiate tournaments, which unfortunately were called off.

Football and Hockey continue to evoke great enthusiasm whilst the four year old cricket club has maintained its growing standard. They played a series of matches and had not a single reverse.

However, in spite of our achievements in games and sports I do not think we can rest quite satisfied with our daily games. No doubt a visitor to Clive's or to the New Hostel may be impressed by the tremendous activity that reigns there during play hours, but in spite of appearances there are many students who play only for the minimum time required during the P. T. classes, or do not play at all. This may be due partly at least to the fact that our grounds are still in the making, so that one is never quite sure whether what was a playground yesterday, will not be a building site to-morrow but it is due still more I think to a lack of enthusiasm on the part of many for an hour's violent exercise—We still lack a decent cricket ground though its completion is within sight, but our sports pavillion will have to wait till all our students are provided with the much needed Hostel accommodation.

U. T. C.

Great changes have taken place in the U. T. C. as a result of the reorganisation of all U. T. C. units and the establishment of a new Battalion with Hd. Qrs. at Trichinopoly. The strength of companies has increased from 120 to 162 Officers and other Ranks; the syllabus of training has been upgraded with a view to giving intensified military preparation to cadets who may eventually join the fighting services; whilst the recognition of the U. T. C. War Certificate Training as part of the University course gives added significance to the value of U. T. C. training. We are singularly fortunate in having Capt. Sundaresan as the Adjutant of this unit, as his long connection with the U. T. C. and his subsequent services in the regular forces have been of great value in

successfully carrying out the reorganisation of this Battalion and in implimenting the new higher training. We rejoice over the appointment of Major P. R. Subrahmanyam as the Commandant of this Battalion and we have every confidence that with his long efficient service in the Corps he will successfully guide its destinies. We wish to congratulate 2/Lieuts. T. V. Krishnan and S. M. Diaz on their appointments as Company commander and Coy. 2nd-in-command respectively and hope they will maintain the high standard of efficiency in training and discipline which has ever been the hall-mark of St. Joseph's Company. Our congratulations are also due to several of our Alumni like Lieuts. T. R. R. Thampi, William Jonas and S. Venkataraman who have taken up war service during the year while our best wishes go to C. S. M. Joseph Nathan, Corporal Antony Cruz and Cadet. Ambrose who are now at the Officers Training Schools.

Buildings & Playgrounds

We are glad to be able to report that in spite of adverse circumstances two more blocks of new Hostel buildings are slowly but steadily rising from the earth, and when they are completed by next June, we shall at long last, have accommodation enough for all those who wish to dwell under our roofs. But even then things will still be far from satisfactory, since Clive's can offer a homely atmosphere, it is true, but at the same time some very bad rooms, long ago condemned by the University commission—Perhaps it may not be out of place here to express our gratitude to the authorities who by their kind co-operation have made it possible for us to proceed with the work of building in spite of the difficulties of the times.

Conclusion

The year which we have just reviewed has been exceptional in many ways, and if we can look back on it not without satisfaction, we owe it above all to almighty God on whose assistance and guidance we further rely; we owe it in the second place to the devotedness and willing co-operation of our staff and the docility and loyalty of our students. True there have been days during the year, which it is not pleasant to recall, one or two occasions on which one might have feared that our traditions had suffered shipwreck in the general turmoil, but it would have been unnatural had we passed unscathed through the tempest. We thank the students for the restraint they have shown on the whole, and exhort them to transmit intact the tradition of discipline, of hard work, of mutual trust which their seniors have handed on to them.

Our thanks are due next to the numerous and ever faithful contributors to our Prize Fund; it has been possible during the course of the year to found the medal in memory of Fr. Steenkiste, the Natesa Mudaliar Prize and the Father Bourdot's Medal. We thank all those who have enabled us thus to perpetuate the memory of those men who gave the best of their lives to the College.

Lastly we thank all the distinguished ^{guests} ~~gent~~s who have responded to our invitation and found it possible to encourage us by their presence here to night. But our thanks are due chiefly to you, Rev. Father, for kindly consenting to preside over this, to you so familiar, function. You need no introduction in this hall where you have so often read the Reports and welcomed the distinguished presidents; the class rooms still seem to echo your clear ringing voice which clarified the mysteries of the English language and made the students love Shakespeare; Clive's still treasures the lessons of good fellowship, of mutual forbearance you inculcated into your wards at a time when there was no New Hostel to absorb the overflow of students and the rooms were crowded even more than now. X

It is indeed a great pleasure for us to see you back among these familiar surroundings and we hope that you also feel happy to be with us. I can assure you that the students of to-day though more numerous and perhaps less tufted, are just as "fine lads" as those you knew and loved.

ANNUAL REPORT 1942-43

SCHOOL DEPARTMENT

I HAVE the honour of offering a hearty welcome to you, Sir, and to this distinguished gathering of friends and well-wishers and of placing before you the ninety-ninth Annual Report of our school for the academic year 1942-43.

Strength

Increase in strength has been a normal feature of our school for a good many years in the past. In August 1942, we reached the maximum number of 1822 pupils, which represents an increase of 35 students over that of the preceding year.

Our school has the unique distinction of having begun its existence with but one pupil on its rolls. That was in September 1844. But to-day, the month in which its one hundredth birthday occurs, our institution has 2035 pupils in the School department and 1820 in the College department, thus making up the impressive total of 3855 students. We could have asked for no better centennial birthday gift from the public than this increase, in the school department alone, of over 200 pupils for a second time in three years. Neither could they have conferred on us a greater honour than the presenting of their treasured youngsters to our keeping in increased numbers, nor could they have manifested in a more striking fashion that their confidence in our institution remains unshaken. Let me then take this opportunity to thank the parents and guardians of our pupils and to assure them that we will try our best to prove not unworthy of the confidence they continue to place in us in an ever increasing measure.

Attendance and Discipline

The average attendance for the year 1942-43 came down to 93.2%, which gives us a fall of 1.4% on that of the preceding year. It is thanks to our boarders, the great majority of whom put in cent per cent attendance, that the figure did not go down lower. The chief cause of this slight fall in attendance is the fact that many parents were reasonably unwilling to send the smaller boys to class for some days due to the fear of their being molested on the way by the 1942 August demonstrators on the roads.

Nothing special need be said about discipline. Many a school has had to pass through numerous anxious days during the course of the past academic year. Thanks to the commendable sense of duty and tactfulness on the part of our teachers and thanks to the equally laudable sense of submissiveness and good behaviour on the part of our boys, our school went through those days without receiving any rude shock to its customary good discipline.

S. S. L. C. Examination Results

We sent up 291 candidates for the S. S. L. C. Public Examination. The fact that there was not a single absentee out of such a large number of candidates incidentally brings into bold relief the remarkable good health with which God has blessed our pupils. Three of the 291 candidates appeared for a few subjects to complete their Certificates. As many as 172 pupils came out successful in the Examination, thus securing for us the satisfactory figure of 60% passes. We could have secured brighter results had we been less lenient in selection. Our students desire that detentions in the VI Form should be reduced to the barest minimum. Consistent, however, with upholding the reputation of our school for creditable results, I for one am quite willing to yield to their wishes, since our pupils after all are the best advertisers of our school. An added temporary reason for leniency in selection is to be found in this that the fact of having sat for the S. S. L. C. Public Examination is in itself a qualification for certain graded posts, chiefly in the armed forces.

I am glad to mention that our school has once again the honour of having presented a larger number of candidates for the Examination than any other school in the South. It has likewise to its credit the largest number of eligibles. In the percentage of passes secured, however, we stand second among those schools

of the South that have presented more than 200 candidates. Among the successful candidates, six have secured more than 400 marks in the aggregate, S. Venkatasubramanian topping the list with 466 marks, and R. Balasundaram coming next best with 430 despite his being handicapped with Chemistry as optional and Tamil for second language. I take this opportunity to offer our congratulations to all of them. One hundred of the successful candidates have joined our College. We also offer our congratulations to Vidwan Cruz Antony on his having secured the B. O. L. degree.

The opening of the new academic year brought with it, as usual, some changes in the Staff. Frs. V. X. Arulanandam, S. J., and M. Marianayagam, S. J., joined the Staff at the commencement of the year. Messrs M. Arumaiselvam. B.A., L.T., and P. R. Swaminathan, B.A., L.T., resumed work after having successfully undergone their L.T. course. Messrs G. Arokiaswamy, B.A., L.T., M. Rajadorai, B. Sc., L.T., I. Diraviam, T. S. Kulandaivelu Mudaliar, and V. Augustine filled the posts left vacant by those who had retired or had left service. Mr. Walter David was appointed additional Physical Instructor, Mr. A. V. Srinivasan, M.A., L.T., was taken

as a temporary Mathematics Assistant. In the course of the year, Mr. P. N. Raman, B.A. (Hons.), L.T., one of our best and enthusiastic teachers, left us, taking with him the good wishes of us all, to take charge of the Trichy Tutorial College as Principal. His place has been ably filled by the appointment of Mr. A. D. Mariapragasam, B.A., L.T. who soon became the Secretary of the Trichinopoly District Scout Association.

Mr. S. Mahadeva Ayyar, our popular Physical Instructor, retired at the end of the year with 34 years of loyal and devoted service to his credit. For many years he was our loud speaker at every sports meet when loud speakers were uncommon in this part of India. Much of our success in the past in the field of sports must be attributed to the enthusiasm he infused into our competitors and the meticulous care with which he trained our teams. In his younger days, he was the first Staff member to be seen in the College and the last to leave it. If our Staff and students are in search of a model of punctuality and honesty, of self-less and ungrudging service to the school, of plain living and high thinking, I would unhesitatingly point out that model in the person of Mr. S. Mahadeva Ayyar. We most sincerely thank him for all his services to our institution and wish him all happiness in his retirement. His place has been filled by the appointment of the young and energetic Mr. J. Jesudasan.

During the summer vacation, Rev. Fr. J. M. Gnanadickam, S. J., came and joined our staff as an experienced and full-fledged Assistant Headmaster. We have another acquisition in Rev. Fr. B. J. Coyle, S.J., who is not merely a Jack of all trades but a master of a good many and as such, besides other duties, has kindly assumed charge of the Physical Education Department. Frs. K. P. Joseph, S.J., J. Lapeire S.J., and R. Saverimuthu, S.J., also joined the staff, while Frs. D. Francis Xavier S.J., and M. Marianayagam, S.J., were transferred, the former to Madura and the latter to Dindigul. In the place of Mr. T. Aiyamperumal Konar, who has been promoted to the College department, Mr. A. S. Michaelswamy Udayar was appointed. We have further additions to the Staff for the current year in the persons of Mr. S. Stanislaus and Vidwans A. S. Govindaswamy Thevar and S. Ponnuswami Udayar.

I must here pay the customary, but none the less sincere and well-deserved, tribute of thanks to the members of our Staff to whom is due all the scholastic and extra-curricular success we have

achieved during the past year. In them we have a band of loyal and zealous workers with whom we are satisfied and to whose fine spirit I here give public expression. The year under review was a hard one for the members of the teaching profession. While their salaried incomes, in spite of the usual increments, remained more or less the same, their expenses have mounted up beyond expectations to three or four times their pre-war level. War-time exigencies will call for yet greater sacrifices and, if past experience be any guide to the future, the indication is that all of us will be called upon to make the greatest sacrifices in the post-war period. Be that as it may, I can confidently say that the Staff and the Management of this institution, linked together as they are in a corporate educational endeavour by bonds far nobler than those based on mere mercenary considerations, will see to it that neither party will let the other down in any unusual emergency that may arise.

School Library.

During the course of the year 1116 new books were added to the Library, and this brings the total number of volumes we possess to 18,861. As many as 18,188 books were issued to the teachers and students. Once again our IV Form boys took more books than either the V or the VI Form students. With the addition of more and more books in Tamil, it is hoped that a fuller use will be made of the Library by all our pupils.

Physical Education

In games and sports, the year was one of normal activity and of considerable success. Our annual sports meet was held on 5th September, 1942. Rev. Fr. Rector presided and gave away the prizes. D. Karuppiah of the VI Form annexed the Championship cup. In the District Sports, we did well and secured the Class I shield, getting four first and six second places.

We took part in all the tournaments conducted by the Trichy District Athletic Association. We came up to the finals in hockey and basket ball. In the football tournament for Seniors, we were declared joint winners with Bishop Heber's, Teppakulam, since we drew thrice in the finals. Our Sub-juniors did well once again and secured the trophy. They improved their own record of last year and had the honour of not allowing even a single goal to be scored

by their opponents in all the tournament matches they played. We came out winners in the volley ball tournament for a second year in succession.

Our Home Tournaments were conducted during the Short Term. There were 20 teams for Football, 4 for Hockey, 5 for Volley ball, 4 for Basket Ball, 26 for Tenikoit and 27 for Badminton. The Boarders in all secured 4 shields—Senior and Sub-junior Football, Hockey and Volley Ball shields; Clive's Hostellers won the Basket Ball and Tenikoit shields; and the Dayscholars won the rest, viz., the Badminton and Junior Football shields and the Midgets' Football Cup. Keen interest and wholesome competition characterized these tournaments. The presentation of trophies and certificates took place on the School Associations' Anniversary Day, 6th March, 1943. Our progress in the field of Physical Education has reached such a stage that now every one of our pupils takes part in one or more major games. We would however like to reach that stage in which every student takes part in at least one of the Home Tournaments.

Literary and Debating Society

The Society has to its credit a record of solid and useful work. Sri C. Raghunathan, the then District Educational officer, Trichinopoly, delivered the inaugural address. Thereafter, the members met no fewer than 55 times and took up for discussion or debate, in English as well as in Tamil, subjects of varied interest, ranging from old time-honoured themes like 'Hobbies' and 'Newspapers' to the live problems of the day like 'Air Raid Precautions' and 'Cottage Industries'. Attendance at all the meetings was fair and the nature of the debates of a highly academic and healthy character. Meetings in Tamil were more lively and animated, since the members felt themselves more at home. Side by side with the activities of the main section, the Boarding House, the Bellarmine Day Boarders and the Clive's Home inmates had their own associations and conducted separate meetings.

The oratorical contests were held as usual and 80 members competed for the prizes. Another interesting innovation this year was the holding of an Essay Competition in both English and Tamil. For the twelve prizes offered, there were 98 competitors. The list of prize winners, 24 in all, is printed elsewhere in the Annual Record. In the S. P. C. A. essay competition, R. Balasundaram of VI Form secured the second prize for his essay in Tamil. The labours of the Society were brought to a fitting close on 6th March

1943, at its valedictory meeting presided over by Rao Bahadur P. Sambandam Mudaliar, B.A., B.L. The renowned dramatist complimented the actors for staging very successfully his own little play "மான்டலார் மீண்டது"

Our pupils achieved complete success in the elocution competition conducted by the National War Front at the recent War Services Exhibition. The three candidates we sent, came first, second and third in the competition for boys' schools. Francis Poobalarayan, VI Form, and I. Mahadevan, V Form, secured the two silver cups and M. P. Anthiah was awarded a certificate for the third place.

Scouting and Junior Red Cross

Our Scout Troop, which was duly affiliated to the All-India Boy Scouts' Association, did good work during the year. Of the 30 Scouts, 22 passed the required tests to secure the Second Class Badge and 5 passed the Tenderfoot tests. Patrol and Troop meetings were held regularly and were well attended. Our Scouts and Cubs took a leading part in the District Scout Rally and fared very well in the Scout Week Competitions, securing two First Place certificates and two Second Place certificates for Ambulance, Signalling etc. Through the kind hospitality extended to our Troop by Rao Saheb G. Rajagopal Pillai of Bichandar Koil, the Annual Camp was a thorough success. In the Inter-Patrol competitions, the Cat Patrol, with S. Viswanathan of V Form for its leader, distinguished itself and won the All-round Efficiency Shield. All the credit for bringing up our Troop to a very high level of efficiency in so short a time, goes to Mr. A. D. Mariapragasam and the two seconders in his efforts Messrs. A. Augustine and G. A. Siluvai Manuel.

Our Junior Red Cross unit was formally inaugurated on 16th January, 1943, with a little over 300 members on its rolls. It is as yet too early to give any report of its substantial achievements. Were it only to inculcate into its members habits of personal health and cleanliness of surroundings its existence will be more than amply justified.

Conclusion

It now remains for me to thank our numerous prize donors but for whose liberal generosity it would have been difficult for us to hold successfully the annual distribution of prizes on the same old scale. Our thanks are next due to the ladies and gentlemen who have so considerately responded to our invitation and have honoured us with their presence here tonight.

We are particularly indebted to you, Sir, for having kindly accepted to occupy the presidential chair and distribute the prizes. We, staff and students, rejoice to see in our midst the head of the municipal administration of our town as our chief guest on this the brightest day of our academic year. Time and again have we tried the patience of the Municipal authorities with our innumerable requests, all of which have been met with sympathy and consideration and for which, through you, we offer our profound thanks to the Municipality. When No-confidence motions in the Commissioner are the order of the day, when there is proverbially little love lost between the Commissioner and the Municipal Council, we rejoice, that in our town complete cordiality and perfect understanding exist between the Council and the Commissioner, which we in no little measure ascribe to your natural tactfulness and practical good sense. We are aware of the very many improvements that have been effected to add to the beauties of the town since your advent and of your efforts to organize recreational centres. Under your administration, we do hope to see our dear old Trichy roads put on a dustless appearance. Thanking you once again, we will now, Sir, proceed to the Distribution of Prizes.

Chemistry Society

The activities of the Society began on the 25th July 1942 with the inaugural address by Rev. Fr. C. Leroyer S.J., Science Master, Campion High School, Trichy, the subject being 'Chemistry and Medicine.' Our Vice-President, Mr. A. C. Joseph M.A., presided. The lecturer dealt at length with the part played by chemistry and chemists on the prevention and cure of diseases.

This was followed by an ordinary meeting on the 8th August when Mr. Venkataraman, IV B. Sc., gave a lecture on 'Selenium.' Mr. A. Rengaswamy, IV B. Sc., occupied the chair.

It is needless to insist upon the advantages and educative value of excursions to chemical factories for budding young chemists. Hence about thirty members of the Society led by Messrs. M. Ramamurthy and V. K. Lonappan visited the newly started industries at Mettur on the 20th August and obtained first-hand knowledge about the manufacture of chlorine, caustic soda, bleaching powder and potassium chlorate.

In these days of so much scarcity of paper and other forms of cellulose, the part played by cellulose in the creation and destruction of civilization was discussed by Mr. Vedavyasachar, IV B. Sc., on the 27th August. Mr. P. K. Sundaram, IV B. Sc., was the president.

On the 17th September Mr. N. Viswanathen presiding, Mr. Krishnamurthy gave a lecture on the use of electricity in chemical industries. On the 4th November Mr. P. S. Gopalakrishnan, IV B. Sc., read a paper on 'Power and fuels.' Mr. K. G. Krishnaswamy was the president.

The next meeting, was on the 10th November and addressed by Mr. P. A. Ignatius, IV B. A., on the methods of production and uses of 'sugars,' Mr. S. Reddy, IV B. A., presided.



On the 14th of the same month with Mr. K. Hariharan IV B. Sc., in the chair, Mr. P. K. Sundaram, IV B. Sc., spoke on the 'Electronic theory of Valency.' 'Fermentation and enzyme action' formed the subject of a lecture by Mr. C. H. Vedavyasachar, IV B. Sc., on the 16th January '43.

On the 19th January, 1943 Mr. P. K. Sundaram, IV B. Sc., explained to the members of the society the theoretical and practical aspects of 'Catalysis.' Mr. K. N. Ragunathen, IV B. Sc., was in the chair.

Mr. P. S. Ramachandran, B. Sc., of the Chemistry Department gave an interesting and exhaustive lecture on 'Vitamins,' from the chair on the 30th January 1943.

The next meeting was addressed on the 3rd February by Mr. K. G. Joseph, IV B. Sc., on "Colour and Constitution." Mr. E. Mathew presided. On the 6th, Mr. P. K. Sundaram gave a talk on the discovery and importance of 'isotopes' in modern science. On the 10th of February Mr. C. K. Ramakrishnan, M.A., gave a detailed account of the sources and importance of gaseous fuels in chemical industries. He also spoke on the development and uses of producer gas for motor transport, consequent on the acute scarcity of petrol felt by us in India.

Accompanied and illustrated by suitable slides from an epidiascope the phenomenon of 'Radio-activity' was explained to an enthusiastic audience by N. Venkataraman, IV B. Sc., on the 16th February. Mr. P. S. Krishnamurthy was in the chair.

As usual an essay competition was conducted by the Society, one for the degree classes, on the use of fats and oils in chemical industries and the position of such industries in India and the other for the Intermediate, on the use of sodium chloride in chemical industries. The first prize for the degree classes is jointly won by Messrs. N. Venkataraman and K. G. Krishnaswamy of the IV. B. Sc. class. The second prize goes to Mr. Krishnamurthy, III. B. A. The first prize for the Intermediate essay is won by Mr. N. Sundaesan, I. U. C. and the second, by Mr. T. R. Balakrishnan, II. U. C.

The valedictory address of our Society was delivered by Dr. K. I. Kuriyan, M. Sc., Ph. D. (Lond.), Professor of Chemistry, Annamalai University on the 20th Feb., 43. Rev. Fr. J. B. Rajam S. J., M. A., D. Sc., Professor of Physics of our College, presided.

The lecturer gave an interesting account of the life and work of some eminent young chemists, like Davy, Perkin Senior etc., illustrated by suitable slides from an epidiascope.

We are glad to record that we had a crowded, interesting and useful programme. We are indeed indebted to the members for their kind co-operation. We shall be failing in our duty if we do not gratefully refer to the ready help and valuable guidance given by our president, vice-president and by the other members of the Chemistry Staff.

The History and Economic Association

On the 21st July 1942 a meeting was held in the Lawley Hall with Mr. M. Arokiasamy, M. A., the Vice-President of the Association in the chair. Mr. C. T. Ramanathan, V Hons., and Mr. F. Theodore, IV Hons., were elected Joint Secretaries for the year 1942-43.

The inaugural address was delivered by Rev. Fr. P. Carty, S. J., on the 11th August. He spoke on the different theories of Socialism under the caption "When Socialists disagree." He examined them in the light of the views expressed by Mrs. Barbara Wootan in a recent article in which she ably criticized the position taken by the socialists.

A debate was held on the 22nd August when Mr. F. Theodore, IV Hons., moved that "Universal compulsory education is an immediate necessity for India." Mr. V. Ramachandran, V Hons. opposed the proposition. Mr. M. Arokiasamy, M. A., was the Speaker. The proposition was carried by a majority. In his concluding remarks, the Speaker pleaded for compulsory primary education for India.

Another debate was held on the 17th October with Mr. S. A. Lobo, M.A., B.L., in the chair. Mr. B. C. Paul, IV U. C. moved that "Democracy is the best form of government suitable to and workable in India". Mr. V. Srinivasan, V Hons., led the opposition. Both sides were agreed that democracy was the best form of government but differed about its workability in India. The motion was defeated.

Mr. A. Hirudayasamy, M.A., B.L., delivered a lecture on "India's Future and the American Example" on the 22nd February 1943. Reviewing the history of the American constitution, the lecturer emphasised the points of similarity between the American and the Indian peoples and urged the solution of the Indian problem on the lines of the American way of government as that was more suitable to Indian conditions than the British parliamentary system.

The valedictory address was delivered by Rev. Fr. P. Carty, S.J., on the 1st March, '43. Speaking on "Co-operation in Economics", he pleaded for a system of active and willing co-operation in production and consumption as a means of reconstruction of the Social Order, for such co-operation would mean, in production, a share for the workers in the profits, in ownership and management of industry and in consumption, the elimination of profits without the elimination of private property.

The Samskrita Samajam

The inaugural address of the Samajam was delivered on the 30th July, 1942 by Sir S. Varadachariar, Judge, Federal Court of India, on 'Characteristics of Sanskrit Literature'. Exhorting the students to make a real and discerning study of Sanskrit, the lecturer pointed out that a revival of Indian culture is possible through the genuine study of Sanskrit.

On August 31, Hanumanth Rao, III Hons. spoke in Sanskrit on 'कविसार्वभौमः कालिदासः'. Briefly surveying the peculiar aspect of his genius, he attempted to prove that he is the master-poet not only of India but of the world.

'Some glimpses of Sanskrit Literature' was the subject of a lecture delivered by Mr. T. Srinivasan, M.A., L. T., on the 15th October, 1942. After tracing the growth of Sanskrit, he explained that Sanskrit pervades all branches of knowledge and is a unifying force.

On the 22nd October, 1942 V. Swaminathan, IV U. C. spoke on 'The Ramayana as a code of human conduct', with Mr. Pranatharthi-haran, B.A., Hons. in the chair. With quotations he dealt in detail with the several ideals of conduct exemplified by the characters of "Ramayana".

On the 13th November, 1942, R. Santanam, III U. C. spoke on 'The Triple Path of Life', with Mr. Totadri Iyengar, M.A., in the chair. He explained the three paths of life namely Duty, Knowledge and Devotion and said that each is complementary to the other.

Mr. K. Chinnasami Iyer, M.A., (Rtd. Prof. of English) addressed the Samajam on 'Some Parallels Between Sanskrit and Western Literatures.' He examined Greek, English and other literatures and pointed out several cases of similarity among the different literatures.

'Kumaradasa and his Place in Sanskrit Literature' was the subject of a talk by Mr. Aiyasamy, IV U. C. on the 10th February 1943. He discussed the date of the poet and brought out, with

quotations, the peculiar characteristics of his work, 'Janakiharana' which is a Mahakavya.

On the 22nd February 1943, V. Rengan, IV Hons. spoke in Sanskrit on भरतलक्ष्मणौ with Mr. V. Gopala Iyengar in the chair. Explaining the leading traits of Bharata and Lakshmana, he pointed out that Bharata shines better than Lakshmana, because of his more implicit obedience to Rama.

On February 10, an elocution competition open to the Intermediate classes was held, when Mr. Totadri Iyengar, Mr. Gopala Iyengar and Mr. Mani were the judges. The prizes were won by K. Narasimhan, I. U. C. (I prize) and B. V. Raman, II U. C. (II prize).

On February 12, an essay competition in Sanskrit was held for the B. A. classes. Mr. Gopala Iyengar, Mr. Mani and Mr. Pranatharthiharan were the judges. The prizes were won by V. Srinivasa Raghavan, IV U. C. (I prize) and G. Doraisamy, III U. C. (II prize)

The valedictory address was delivered by Sri P. G. Subramanya Iyer, M.A. on the 27th February 1943, on "A code of conduct." After giving a brief account of the various stages of human civilisation, he stressed the need for a proper aim in life and pointed out that the highest ideal of education is to train ourselves to deserve the grace of God.

Malayalee Samajam 1942-'43

The year under report opened with the meeting of the general body on the 14th July, 1942 with Mr. T. K. Devasia in the chair. C. B. Joseph of the IV U. C. and P. Gopalakrishnan of the I U. C. were elected secretaries for the academic year.

The inaugural address of the Association was delivered by His Grace the Most Rev. Mar Ivanios, M.A., D.D., Archbishop of Trivandrum. In his address His Grace stressed the need for loving the mother-tongue as the Bengalis do and insisted on the necessity of cultivating the art of speech with clarity and fluency.

On August 6, 1942, we had a debate when C. K. Koshy, IV U. C. moved the resolution that Communal Unity should be a necessary antecedent to Indian independence. B. C. Paul, IV U. C. opposed the motion. Mr. M. M. Mani, M.A. was the Speaker. After a heated discussion the motion was thrown out.

At a meeting held on August 31, 1942 P. M. Padmanabhan, III (Hons.) spoke on the poetry of Changapuzha, Anselm Netto, IV U. C. presiding.

The second term opened with an interesting debate on "Women are not the weaker sex." The proposition moved by A. I. Thomas, III U. C. was opposed by T. A. Paulose, IV U. C. Mr. Joseph Minattur M.A., acted as the Speaker. The motion was lost.

The next debate was held on November 5, 1942, with Rev. Fr. Philip Erattamakil in the chair. T. N. Kuriappan, III B. Sc. moved the resolution that "Western Contact has resulted in more evil than good." A. C. Chiramel, III U. C. opposed it. The resolution was passed.

On the 17th November 1942, B. C. Paul, IV U. C. delivered a lecture on "Free India," Rev. Fr. Jacob Kalayil presiding.

On January 21, 1943, P. Surendranatha Menon, IV B. Sc. (Hons.) spoke on "Mary Magdalene in literature and in society." Mr. V. V. Joseph presided on the occasion.


An extra-ordinary meeting was held on the 28th January, 1943 under the presidentship of Mr. T. K. Devasia, when Mr. S. Guptain Nair, B.A. (Hons.), a research scholar of the Travancore University, delivered a lecture on "Modern Literature." The speaker lucidly analysed the various currents in world literature with special reference to Malayalam literature.

On February 5, 1943 a debate was held on the proposition "A separate Kerala province is unnecessary." Damodara Pisharodi, III B. Sc. (Hons.) moved the resolution and P. M. Jussay II U. C. opposed it. The motion was rejected.

The annual speech contest took place on February 9, 1943. In the B. A. extempore speech competition, P. Surendranatha Menon, IV B. Sc. (Hons.) and B. C. Paul, IV U. C. won the first and second prizes respectively. In the elocution competition open to the students of the Intermediate Classes, K. V. Abraham, I U. C. and V. V. Jose, II U. C. were the winners. Rev. Fr. Mathew Thekaekara, S.J. and Messrs. A. C. Joseph and N. Ananthakrishnan kindly acted as judges.

The valedictory address was delivered by Mr. P. K. Sivasankara Pillai, M.A. on February 20, 1943. Rev. Fr. Thomas Purakal, S.J. presided. The speaker dwelt on the characteristics of early Malayalam songs and appealed to the audience to take interest in them.

ANNUAL ATHLETIC SPORTS

1942-1943

THE College annual athletic sports finals came off on Saturday the 5th September, 1942; and for the first time in our athletic annals the sports meet was held in the afternoon. The change from the growing hot sun of the morning to the cooler hours of the evening has been so welcome to the competitors and spectators alike that a strong desire has been expressed to make the change permanent. The trees which have grown to fine proportions afforded ample shade to the vast crowd of spectators whilst the guests and the staff were accommodated in the decorated pandal.

Amidst the sweet strains of music and the hearty cheers and encouragement of the spectators very keen competition was witnessed in all the events. We are happy that while the records in all the events are of a fairly high order. E. J. Sam deserves special mention for his clearing 5' 5" in high jump. Our Athletic team which had a successful season last year has now been reinforced by the return of our crack sprinter, Natesan and the arrival of sportsmen like Sam and Sundram.

The championship prize was annexed by J. Andrews (26 points) after a close and relentless fight with D. Natesan who left the ring with but 3 points less. Andrews' Atlantic flights round the oval and his finish in the mile and cross country races in such fine style and ease are a piece of unforgettable delight.

The most hilarious event of the programme was undoubtedly the staff relay race where no less than 20 members took part and only one is reported to have staged a 'walk-out' as a protest against the race being too swift! No less interesting was the challenge tug-of-war between the staff and the New Hostel team.

Rev. Fr. Rector presided and gave away the prizes. Whilst congratulating and appreciating physical skill, he extolled the higher virtues of the mind and soul. He said: "It is in the fitness of things to proclaim your praises, your varied achievements deserve

our praises and I am not loath to give you your full need of them. To win a race or to be first in a jump demands more than merely good lungs and muscles. We all have lungs and muscles but we are not all first in the races. More than brawn and sinews is required. It demands skill. We must remember the words of the English painter who when a friend asked him with what he mixed his colours to obtain the marvellous effects he secured answered with a superior twinkle in his eye 'With brains, Sir.' Like art, athletic sports demand skill. They demand that a thing be done not only with strength but with controlled strength—neatly, gracefully with no waste of time or energy. Such action demands brains. And it is a good schooling for life. Hence it has been said that sports are a more immediate school of life than the ordinary academic courses. Is that really so? To a certain extent it is! It is a common saying that education of whatever kind should enable a man to pull his own weight in society. Obviously, athletics enable a man to do that. True education, however, demands that a man pull his own weight not only in the physical plane but also and especially in the social, intellectual and moral plane. Athletics, therefore, must subserve the higher marks of education by contributing to the proper hygiene not only of the body but of the mind, soul and spirit.

"Let us in conclusion liberally mete out to the happy winners of the day their full and well deserved share of praise and congratulations", Fr. Rector concluded.

With 'God Save the King' and cheers to Rev. Fr. Rector, Fr. Principal and others the happy function came to a close.

Cricket Notes

Undefeated, we marched on to the end of the year's cricket, which was not very enterprising. It is a matter of deep regret for us that we did not have the Inter-collegiate tournament this year, and the more so that we were not given the opportunity of a tour, in spite of the fact that we had a very good side. In the few matches that we played we did exceedingly well, winning five and losing none; four ending in a draw. It is a matter for congratulation that this is the first year, of the four year old cricket team, in which we did not experience a single reverse.

The first two matches with the Trichy United cricket club ended in a draw. Then we had a couple of games, one at Pudukotah and the other at Sivaganga. At Pudukotah we made 98 and 191, to which H. H. the Raja's XI replied with 114 and 94. For our side Perumal scored 66 and Aruldoss 24. Kalyanam, who had the misfortune to be run out when he was only eight short of his century, with Perumal, put on 150 runs and pulled the side to a safe total in the second knock. Thanks to the brilliant piece of bowling by Perumal, Parthasarathy and David, we were able to snatch the victory by 81 runs, after a race with the clock.

We had a good game at Sivaganga with the Raja's XI. In the first innings we were dismissed for 80 runs, Parthasarathy remaining unbeaten with 32. The Raja's XI scored 164, Aruldoss returning the fine analysis of 7 wickets for 25 runs. When we had made 175 for 5 (Aruldoss 57, Kalyanam 59 not out), stumps were drawn and the match ended in a draw.

The match with the Ormsby Institute was marked by the brilliant century by Aruldoss who retired after making 115. To our total of 248, they could only reply 77. Perumal bagged 5 wickets for 14 runs. We won by 171 runs.

We beat the Royal Air Force by 132 runs. The century by Aruldoss, which was characterised by all-round hitting, and Rathnakar Rai's unbeaten 40, carried our score to 195. The Air force was skittled out for 63 runs, Perumal again coming out with seven wickets to his credit.

In the return match with the Ormsby Institute, we made 222 runs, of which Kalyanam contributed a well-hit 126. Little Freddy, who has a bright future, assisted him well to put on 140 runs for the seventh wicket. When the Institute had lost 8 wickets for 43 runs, rain interfered and the match ended in a draw.

In another match we beat a strong side from the Royal Air Force. Against their good bowling we were able to make only 99 runs. But we fought the game out until we got them out for 67 runs, thanks to the bowling of Perumal and Parthasarathy.

The Trichy United cricket club was dismissed for 95 runs of which a good 42 was contributed by their captain, R. P. Thiagarajan. Perumal returned the fine analysis of 6 for 34. We hit up a total of 204 for the loss of 5 wickets, Aruldoss making 52 (retired), David

38, Parthasarathy 36 (not out); Perumal 28 (not out) and Sundaram 26. Thus the last match of the season ended in a big victory of 5 wickets and 109 runs for our team.

On the whole this year's record is highly satisfactory. Our speed-merchant, Aruldoss again repeated the "double" by scoring a thousand runs (including four centuries) and capturing 100 wickets which is indeed a splendid performance and Kalyanam passed the thousand mark which included three centuries. This year's batting average was topped by Kalyanam with Aruldoss running close, Perumal, Parthasarathy, Rai, Sundaram, our left hander and Freddy following. The work with the leather was done best by Perumal, with Parthasarathy, David and Aruldoss following. It is sorrowful to find our gallant companion Rathnakar Rai, who had pulled the side out of the fire on many occasions and who showed great promise this year, left us in the middle owing to a break-down in health. And a word must be said about the other members, Hariharan, Sathiamoorthy, Venkataraman, Mani and Sounderarajan and our grand old man, Srinivasan who all did their job earnestly throughout. I am glad to refer here to the excellent spirit with which our men played, and their co-operation with me in filling the year with so much success. From start to finish, a very high sense of teamspirit was maintained. And with more facilities for outside fixtures, and with more encouragement, the college cricket team will pass on from success to glory.

The College annual athletic day celebrations were held on the Mahé grounds on Saturday, the 27th February, 1943. Mir Amirruddin Esq. M.A., LL.B., Bar-at-law, District and Sessions Judge, Trichinopoly, presided.

The finals in the Basketball tournament between the IV U. C. and the B. Sc. teams proved a real treat to the numerous spectators. With Alagiri fighting, Arumugham darting and Neelakantan sweating, the outcome was held in suspense almost till the last moment. Whilst the IV U. C. team were eventually the winners by a narrow margin, the runners-up and particularly Neelakantan deserve special commendation.

The match over, the general captain, R. Arokianathan, presented the annual report as follows.

'Athletic Annual Report.' 1942-1943

The achievements of our College athletic team this year are unique in the annals of the College. Clear signs of this were seen in the keen competition and the fine records set up at the annual sports held on the Mahé Grounds on Saturday, the 5th September, '42. Rev. Fr. Rector presided and distributed the prizes. For the first time the College Annual Sports were held this year in the afternoon and the success achieved has brought forth a unanimous desire to make the change permanent.

The athletic team, strong though it was even last year, was further re-inforced by sprinters D. Natesan, J. Sundaram and F. Vincent, our old high school champions. With the systematic grinding they received in the form of continuous practice under the guidance and supervision of the staff member-in-charge our athletic team went to Pudukotta for the Dussera Tournaments and easily annexed a number of prizes and the Championship Cup. The individual championship Cup too was won by D. Natesan. In spite of the unexpected departure of our energetic sprinter, Ratnakar Rai, Fighter Kunjanunni and the veteran miler, Royappan, our team competed with confidence at the T. D. A. A. sports and won the open Shield for the second year in succession. We should not fail to mention the splendid performance of Jacob Andrews at the R. I. A. S. C. Annual Sports at Trichinopoly. He finished first in the open Mile Race in such fine style that all the spectators and the District Collector were full of praise for him. Buoyed up by these successes we sent up the team to Coimbatore for the Olympic Sports early in February and with pleasure we record here that they lived up to their reputation. No less than 27 prizes and the RAO BAHADUR THIRUVENGADA MUDALIAR OPEN CHALLENGE CHAMPIONSHIP CUP were annexed by them. A few of these athletes formed part of the Coimbatore Olympic Association Team at the Madras Olympics last week. It is reported that the full team did not turn up. But our College athletes acquitted themselves well by carrying away prizes in Hurdles, Pole Vault and High Jump.

Thanks to the keen interest taken by Rev. Frs. Vattathara and Arulsami, our Football and Hockey teams began practice early in the year and played a number of matches winning practically all those.

But dame luck is evasive. The teams just missed their chance at the T. D. A. A. Sports. In spite of their thumping victory over the Madura American College Football Team, our usual opponents in the Divisional Finals, our College Football Team which participated at the Pudukotta Dussera Tournaments had to return with the satisfaction that they put up a good fight against the veteran footballers of Pudukotta, led by one of our own ex-captains.

Rev. Fr. Rapinat, S.J. had rather a difficult problem to solve regarding tennis balls. He deserves congratulations on having been able to keep the tennis courts working all the year round. The enthusiasm of the members continues at its height. Though we cannot boast of a budding Tilden or a Ghouse Mohammad, our standard is indeed good.

The departure of our googly bowler, Ramakrishnan and the plucky Srinivasagopal certainly weakened our College Cricket Team but the return of Parthasarathi to the College and the addition of Perumal have fairly kept up the standard. We played a series of matches at Trichy against nine local teams and had not a single reverse. We won 5 whilst 4 ended in a draw. Our tour to Pudukotta and Sivaganga was a huge success. We had a decided victory over the Maharaja's Elevens at Pudukotta while the match at Sivaganga ended in a draw. Perhaps, it will not be out of place to mention that the Raja of Sivaganga was so pleased with our team that he presented a fine bat to our captain, Kalyanam.

The decision of the University authorities not to conduct the Inter-collegiate tournaments this year proved a great disappointment. Of course, we do not mean to claim the 100% efficiency of an electric motor when it does no work or the extra-special distinction which a candidate might have secured had he sat for the examination; but the performances of our teams really justify our belief that we would have won laurels had the usual tournaments been held.

Our Volley Ball and Basket Ball Teams maintained their very high standard. They competed at the Loyola College Tournaments in August and brought home both the trophies and the admiration of all the metropolitans. It is still a wonder how such a fine team in Volley Ball, with the addition of a few more to form nines at the T. D. A. A. Tournament failed to achieve recognition. The Basket Ball Team still goes unchallenged. The T. D. A. A. Tournament was not held owing to paucity of entries. With pardonable pride we record here that a responsible member of the Loyola College

Staff remarked that a B. B. Team from all the other Madras Colleges put together would not stand us. Of course, the test was not made.

The College Badminton team which was counting on snatching away the T. D. A. A. Open Shield for the 3rd year in succession was sorely deprived of its chance. The tournament was not held. Enough teams did not offer themselves to play against us.

The third term witnessed keen rivalry and excellent competition in the various intra-mural tournaments. We had to cope with an unusually large number of entries: 6 in B. B., 16 in V. B., 8 in Hockey, 12 in F. B., and 47 in Badminton. We are thankful to the several gentlemen who kindly helped us in conducting these tournaments.

Before concluding, allow us just to mention that we have been watching with pleasure the levelling up, or better, the growth of the new playgrounds on the west. We have yet to have a good cricket pitch for matches, a permanent running track for our athletes and facilities for minor games as Badminton, Volley Ball, and Basket Ball for the day-scholars. We are confident that when our plans are completed, we shall have not only these but a fine sports pavilion too.

The President then distributed the certificates and cups to the winners and runners-up in the various home tournaments.

Whilst speaking of the achievements of the College teams in the various games the president humorously remarked that they would annex not only the shields and cups from Pudukotta and Coimbatore but even the World Olympic trophy. And as for the new extensions in the playgrounds he suggested having not only the pavilion but even a pucca stadium!


With a hearty vote of thanks and cheers to the president and all the guests present the pleasant evening function came to a close.

Administrative Group Indian Engineers, Trichinopoly, who presided on the occasion made a short speech congratulating the winners and with his intimate knowledge of the high standard of the St. Joseph's College Contgt. of the U. T. C. advised the men to keep up their high traditions and to be second to none though forming the constituents of the new 2nd Bn.

IN MEMORIAM



THE LATE VERY REV. FR. W. LEDOCHOWSKI

 ON the 13th of December, 1942 passed away at Rome Very Rev. Fr. Włodimir Ledochowski, General of the Society of Jesus for the past twenty-eight years, one of the most remarkable figures in the four centuries of Jesuit history. He was born on 7th October, 1866, at Loosdorf in Austria of a noble Polish family which for generations had been famous for signal services in the Church and in the state. Włodimir had his early training in the humanities and the sciences in an academy for nobles in Vienna, and later spent a year on civil law. Having decided to become a priest, he joined the Seminary of Tarnow, studied there for two years, and then for another two years in the Gregorian University of Rome. Throughout his student career he showed a talent far above the ordinary. He took the Doctor's degree in philosophy from the Gregorian and then left for Poland to join the Society of Jesus. Within seven years his period of training as a Jesuit was completed, and immediately began the series of responsible offices he was to hold in the Society till his death.

Fr. Ledochowski was successively member of the editorial staff of the Polish periodical "Universal Review" run by the Jesuits of Cracow, editor of the same journal, rector of the college in Cracow, and Provincial of the whole Galician Province. From 1906 onwards he was attached to the Roman Curia or the General's head-quarters as Assistant for Germany, that is, the supreme consultor of the General in matters concerning the six Provinces in and around Germany. On 11th of February, 1915, he was elected General of the Order.

The first and the last years of this Generalate were stormy periods; they coincided with two of the greatest cataclysms in human history. Even the two decades of comparative peace in between the wars could hardly be called normal; the rise and fall of dictators, mass executions, new experiments in statecraft, the duel for power,—all these kept the nations in turmoil, and behind all was too great an attachment to material goods, and a tendency to forget the true spiritual values, the things that matter, the things which the Catholic Church and its religious Orders stand for. It was Fr. Ledochowski's great achievement ever to hold aloft the banner of God, and in spite

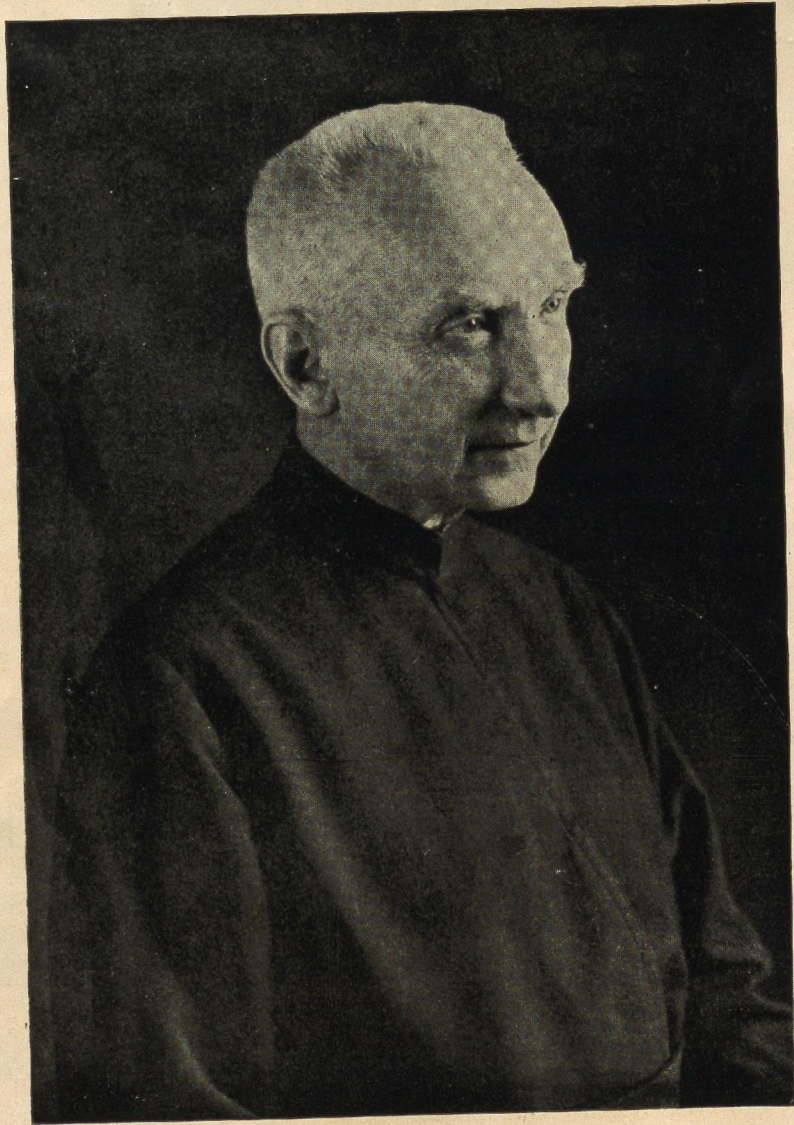
of the times to secure rapid progress and outstanding success in every line of work that the members of his Order were engaged in. In 1915 the number of Jesuits in the world was 17,000; today they are over 27,000, showing a vast increase due, under God, to the zeal and initiative of the General. No less striking has been the development in every phase of Jesuit activity,—in social uplift, youth organisations, apostolate of the press, management of seminaries, missionary enterprise, education, and the like. One example would suffice as an illustration. In 1915 the number of periodicals edited by Jesuit Fathers was 200; by 1936 the number had risen to 1,100. In the field of education, that many new colleges and universities have been undertaken by the Jesuits and that today there are Jesuits as specialists in almost every branch of science are due in great measure to the new orientation given by Fr. Ledochowski. Gifted with an accurate memory for details, a brilliant intellect to plan on a grand scale and to execute, and a powerful pen to communicate his plans and to elicit enthusiasm, he has been able to guide and organize to the best effect the widely scattered forces of his Order, and to keep blazing before all the one great goal, A. M. D. G. Fr. Ledochowski has passed away; but his works remain, and one cannot forget that for twenty-eight years the Society of Jesus was governed by so great a figure.

THE LATE NATESA MUDALIAR

Mr. Mudaliar's death on the 13th December last removed from our midst an accomplished student of Tamil literature and a most popular and honoured colleague. He was more of a student than a pandit, for he never ceased to increase his stock of Tamil learning. Some of the great classics he had read nearly a hundred times, and one in particular a thousand times, and it was his practice to make a note of it each time that he completed a reading. Though he was not in the habit of indulging in extemporised quotation, he knew by heart nearly every classic in Tamil.

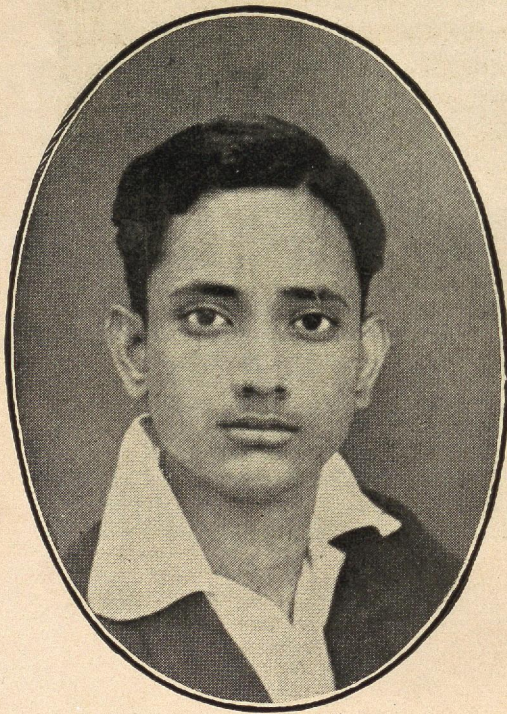
He passed the Matriculation examination from St. Joseph's College and had won several certificates for proficiency in the school. He had read several of the modern English writers except the novelists and sometimes he used them as models for his own writing and speaking in his native tongue. He is the author of nearly six works in Tamil and at the time of his death there were certain manuscripts ready for publication. He enjoyed the esteem of the renowned Tamil



VERY REV. FR. WLODIMIR LEDOCHOWSKI, S.J.



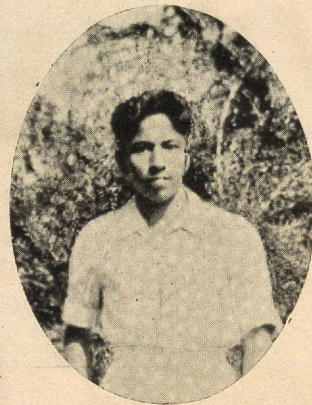
LATE MR. M. NATESA MUDALIAR

scholars of the Presidency who treated him with the greatest deference. And yet our Pundit never had any of the airs of the condescending scholar. On the contrary, he had rendered to others more services than he ever received from any.

From the copyist's desk in the District Court of Trichinopoly he rose to be the lecturer in Tamil of St. Joseph's College by hard and persevering toil. Early in life he cultivated a taste for Tamil and learnt from the Great Gnaniar of Thiruppapuliur the secrets which made him the accomplished scholar that he became. He never forgot the debt he owed to his great Guru and served him with the devotion of a disciple.

The late Mr. Mudaliar was a most popular figure; there are few either in Trichy or in the Province worthy of note who were not known to him. To walk by his side was sometimes a sore trial; he stopped after every few words to greet and felicitate some old friend or new acquaintance. He literally walked with the hand half-lifted up in salute.

Many there are who owe much to this unassuming Pundit. Few could resist the charm of his manner and fewer still would deny him a favour. Seemingly forlorn causes would find an easy solution at his dexterous hand. His prudence, caution and knowledge of human nature enabled him to deal with men with sure success. His death at the early age of 53 from the cruel disease of diabetes is indeed a grievous loss to the members of his family, to the College and to Tamil literature.

During the course of the last academic year the College had to mourn the death of two of its alumni, both carried away rather suddenly by that student's dread disease, typhoid. Being cut off from life in the flower of youth is saddening to record, unless it be with the glory of death *pro patria*, in the battlefield. It means so much of hopes unfulfilled, expectations raised but thwarted. And the disappointment is all the greater when those called away are of the splendid type of Ramanathan and D'Cruz.

V. Ramanathan had been but a short time in this College; but that short time was long enough to make his loss keenly felt by his

friends. That bright intelligent look and that quickness to grasp tough topics might have augured great things for the future; but death claimed its victim all too soon. He was born on 15th March, 1924. For his school career he had been obliged to wander about a lot, from Tuticorin to Orattanad, then to Kodavasal and lastly to Madura. At Madura he passed the S. S. L. C. examination, and studied for the Intermediate in the Madura College. In July, 1942, he joined III B. Sc. (Chemistry Main) in St. Joseph's. Towards the end of the first term he felt unwell and went home before completing the September examinations. The disease soon became serious, and was diagnosed to be typhoid; a long drawn out struggle for life ensued, and the end came on 11th October.

Paschasius D'Cruz had spent a longer time in the College, and had finished his whole Intermediate course. After spending seven years under the Jesuit Fathers in the European High School, Cannanore, he came to Trichy in July 1941. He was rather late for the admissions; but the then Principal, with his quick eye for sterling qualities, admitted him immediately into the group he wanted. Judging from his quiet, unassuming exterior, few would have imagined that he had had a most brilliant school career—being at the very top in almost every class, securing prizes for good conduct, holding important offices in the Sodality and other school organisations, and with all that, carrying away practically all the trophies for games and athletics. Few boys could have shown such an all round record. During the two years he spent in Trichy, he kept up the record in the College and Boarding House; he was an outstanding sportsman, one of the best players of the College hockey team, an efficient student, and a perfect Catholic. He wrote the Intermediate examination and went home for the holidays. Being on a visit to Gudalur in the Nilgiris, he contracted typhoid, and died shortly afterwards, on April 3rd 1943. The Intermediate results appeared a few weeks later with the news that he had passed; but that is little joy to him now that God Himself is his Joy. R. I. P.
