In the last six months the Pune tree watch group of which KV is a key player has done the following activities. Though it will be important to mention here that the pace and scope of work has increased beyond our expectations.

- 1) Yahoo group to share information on tree cutting and progress on action taken by members and the authorities
- 2) Responding to alerts that have come to the group, going to the places and trying to ensure action by contacting the garden dept. and the required follow-up.
- 3) Helping citizens with the follow-up process.
- 4) Prompt responding, reporting on the activities or actions back to the group.
- 5) Connecting people to the required authorities or members that belong to a particular area.
- 6) Website as part of KV website which records work done by various members of PTW, responses by the authorities, media coverage and related interesting items.
- 7) Keeping watch on tree cutting in the city. Verifying if permission has been taken for the particular tree(s) and lodging a complaint if permission has not been taken.
- 8) Procuring the docket from Garden Dept. every month, which lists the applications received for tree cutting and remarks by the Garden Dept. and tree authority based on their site visits.
- 9) Meeting with people, groups (Mohalla Committees etc.) and organisations on a very regular basis.
- 10) Making site visits to figure out if it is necessary to cut the trees and make suggestions for alternatives so that some or all trees can be saved.
- 11) Giving written letters of objections and recommendations to Garden Dept. based on site visits
- 12) Attending the monthly meetings and the ad-hoc meetings called by the Pune Tree authority where the objections are discussed and further decisions are made.
- 13) Attending meetings on similar issues called by other groups and NGO's in Pune.
- 14) Building relationships with good officials, NGO's, corporators and other people who might help in stopping tree destruction.
- 15) Negotiate with Garden Dept. and the Pune Tree Authority for better implementation of the Maharashtra Tree Act. Understand the process of implementation of Maharashtra Tree act and understand the flaws, loopholes and make suggestions for improvement in the Act
- 16) Negotiating with the Garden dept. to enable spaces for citizens to help.
- 17) Spread awareness and empower other citizens to stop tree cutting and be more responsible towards their environment.
- 18) Integrate this into work by other groups such as PTTF, NSCC.
- 19) Responding to Media enquiries as well as interacting with the Media.
- 20) Capacity Building within the group on the various aspects of the issue – Maharashtra Tree Act, system of functioning of the Garden Dept..
- 21) Study and research on laws and policies relating to the Urban Environment.
- 22) Using KV's resources to facilitate the work of Pune Tree Watch.

The role of the co-ordinator of the Pune Tree Watch [though with the help of KV members]

It is all of the above actually -

- A) Co-ordinating the PTW activities, yahoogroup and website
- B) Strategising and planning future action and activities.
- C) Documentation and Analysis
- D) Making personal contact with members to ensure participation.
- E) Site inspection and filing objections
- F) Maintaining contact with the relevant authorities of the Garden Dept and the Forest Dept.
- G) Cordinating with the Media.
- H) Research and Investigation wherever possible.
- I) Liason with Ngo's, people, PTA members and Garden Dept.

The responsibility of the co-ordinator

- A) Seen as the face of PTW
- B) Keeping the PTW gang together
- C) Interact with KV to get inputs and take the process forward

KV's Role

So far KV has got a group of interested and committed people together who are far more effective and stronger as a group . Earlier a few individuals were trying to fight the system and have had a hard difficult time. Getting a group like PTW gets the issue more attention and visibility which is very empowering for the ordinary citizen.

The role that KV and Tasneem as the co-ordinator is playing is very similar to situation of KV in the Conservation and livelihoods group where KV was a key member and part of the core group.

The challenges are similar though the context is different .

Given the above, What should KV's role be now that some **systems of monitoring tree cutting are more streamlined** Focus on awareness building

- A) Focus on capacity building within the members
- B) docket and following up on individual cases
- C) Focus on forging good relations with authorities and follow up at the level of PTA
- D) Focus on bringing changes to the Maharashtra Tree Act... slowly.

1. The proposal on Mula Mutha conservation reserve is not to be clubbed with the proposal as Kapil of CEE is already co-ordinating it.
2. Discussions are on with RANWA to figure out if the proposal on tree watch could be part of their proposal (UNDP) .Tasneem is coordinating this.
3. A Proposal to get funding for the list of activities (listed above) is to be put together with a budget for two years.
 - a) Nature of activity , Person coordinating and introduction to the work
 - b) Record of work done on this during the last two years. Shantha to help with this. Everyone requested to supply as much info as possible.
 - c) Existing collaborator
 - d) Budget under various heads such as local travel, computer, communication, stationer, documentation
4. SP and SB to put together the proposals with inputs from all over email . July 21 is the deadline for putting together this proposal as KV meets on 29 for a larger discussion on proposals
5. Tasneem to look and identify funders for this project.

CBGA organised and conducted 5 three-day Capacity Building workshops on Budget Analysis and Advocacy at several parts of country. There were around 25-30 participants in each workshop. This was a major step initiated by CBGA for capacity building of the civil society for undertaking independent budget analysis and advocacy work. These Workshops were organised in collaboration with one of the partner organisations in the relevant region.

Capacity Building on Budget Analysis and Advocacy, Bhubaneswar, Orissa

This programme was conducted in collaboration with the Centre for Youth and Social Development (CYSD), Bhubaneswar from 1 to 3 November 2004. The participants were from civil society organisations who were either already working on budget analysis or interested to take up budget analysis.

Capacity Building on Budget Analysis and Advocacy, Bhopal, Madhya Pradesh

This programme was conducted in collaboration with SAMARTHAN, Bhopal from 24 to 26 November 2004. Over 30 people from various parts of Madhya Pradesh have actively participated in the workshop.

Capacity Building on Budget Analysis and Advocacy, Jaipur, Rajasthan

This programme was conducted in collaboration with the Budget Analysis Rajasthan Centre (BARC) Jaipur from 16 to 17 December 2004.

Capacity Building on Budget Analysis and Advocacy, Pune, Maharashtra

This programme was conducted in collaboration with the National Centre for Advocacy Studies (NCAS), Pune from 15 to 17 January 2005. There were more than 45 participants from all over Maharashtra who showed keen interest in budget analysis.

Capacity Building on Budget Analysis and Advocacy, Ahmedabad, Gujarat

This programme was conducted in collaboration with UNNATI, Ahmedabad from 19 to 21 January 2005.

7.5 Networking /Collaborations

CBGA is networking with a number of organizations at the regional, national as well as international level. CBGA has been coordinating closely with the budget and other groups, in taking the momentum forward in making budgetary and governance processes transparent and pro-people.

- **International Budget Project (IBP):** CBGA has been collaborating with IBP of the Centre for Budget and Policy Priorities (CBPP), Washington DC on the 'Open Budgets Questionnaire' survey in 2003-04. The first draft questionnaire was completed in July-August 2003 followed by the revised draft questionnaire (February 2004) and the final in March 2004. The Country report was prepared on the basis of these questionnaires. CBGA publications like Budget Track, Marginalised Matters 2003-04 are part of the reference list in the IBP website. The team also contributed two articles in the January 2004 newsletter of IBP on Budgets in India and WSF 2004. Through out the year 2004-05 the process of collaboration continued, and the team clarified all the questions raised

YOUR IDEA BILL

1. On the first of November some of us representing Pune Tree Watch and Kalpavriksh sought a meeting with the Pune Municipal Commissioner who is also the chairman of the Pune Tree Authority. We put forth our grievances also with the help of a letter (available at just.tasneem@gmail.com). Basically what he said was
 - A) He has designated the Additional Municipal commissioner to chair the meeting of PTA.
 - B) He has asked us to come up with a set of criteria for the selection of the co-opted members of the next Pune Tree Authority.
 - C) He will direct the Garden department to give adequate notice to public about tree cutting applications.
 - D) He also said the amendment of the Maharashtra Tree act was on the card soon and we should give inputs to concerned agencies immediately. He said he would give us more details on this. Till that time he has mentioned that we could put together rules under the Tree Act and give it to him. He said that we could take this on one step at a time.
 - E) He mentioned that there is a rule that no construction will be allowed 1.5 mtrs along the boundary wall of any land. He said this rule is for saving and tree plantations. He also said that he would give us a copy of that rule.
2. In Pune there is an ongoing conflict on the construction of a new road on a forested hill called the Law College Hill or Vetal tekdi (see also blog <http://rescuepune.blogspot.com>). The area in question is an ecological hotspot for Pune's Urban Environment and there are many studies that report good biodiversity and ecological value. This has been going on for a long time now but things are getting serious each day as trees are getting cut at a very fast pace to clear the area for the roads. The 'forests' on the Law College Hill qualify as forests as per the interpretation of the Honourable Supreme Court and any claim by PMC that they do not need clearance under the Forest (Conservation) Act, 1980, is in contravention of the orders of the Supreme Court. Clearly the ongoing tree felling on Law College Hill by the PMC for construction of the Paud Phata - Balbharti road is in violation of Supreme Court orders dated 12th December, 1996 in the Writ Petition (Civil) No. 202 of 1995 (T.N. Godavarman Vs Union of India) and the Forest (Conservation) Act, 1980. A number of environmentally conscious groups and individuals are fighting this against the PMC (Pune municipal Corporation). All pleas, signatures and arguments are falling on deaf ears... there is a strong political (and an alleged builders) lobby backing this road and many citizens are also supporting it. There have been attempts to create an awareness with Puneites, politicians and authorities about the fallouts of the construction of this road but that is not yielding the desired results. This has been petitioned at the lower end courts like the PMC and the district court but there has not been much of a headway there so now these groups are planning to approach the high court. To initiate stronger action Kalpavriksh has written a letter to the Central Empowered Committee on the Balbharati Paud rd issue. The CEC has been appointed by the Supreme Court to look at forest based issues. The CEC has sent a letter to the Chief Secretary, Maharashtra, directing them to institute an enquiry and send them a report in response to our letter on the Paud Phata - Balbharti road. They have asked them to ensure that no construction work is carried out in deemed forest as per SC orders and the FCA.(see pdf file). Despite receiving copies of the CEC directive the work on the Balbharati continued. To mount public pressure needs to mount on them we asked members of Pune Tree Watch and other concerned citizens to fax to the commissioner a letter (see attached) asking him to stop the work.
3. A get-together of tree lovers and to screen a series made on Trees by Sir David Attenborough was organized on 19th of November. The series are in six parts and covers almost all aspects of tree life. As one member who attended the show reports - "The films at Aundh were amazing. Though I could not see them

all, but thanks to Niranjan and Anchal (Sanjay Sondhi and family) for all the arrangements (and snacks + tea). What a collection!! Fantastic. " " Rohan Vaidya promised to look for volunteers and arrange for projector if these films need to be shown to people. I have taken inspiration again to contact schools to show these films to children. I will be visiting Abhinav Vidyalaya today/this week to talk with the Principal. I will check if school teachers teaching biology/env. subject can be contacted/trained first. "

4. We have already highlighted that most of the complaints that we have lodged are missing out on the action component. Notices sent to the offenders play a languid role wherein the fine amount is hardly coughed up at all. In order to spruce this up and monitor the entire process more systematically. To ensure that the garden dept. is taking corrective action against the complaints that members of Pune Tree Watch have been raising, we decided to put together a list of complaints/letters etc. and send them to the tree officer for feedback and attention marking it also to the commissioner and the addtl commissioner.
5. At Aundh members of Pune Tree Watch, Samir and Anchal met the contractor who is making about footpath in front of McDonald's in Aundh. He had promised to leave some space at intervals for tree plantation. But we observed he had not left spaces. On discussion with contractor, they found that he can not leave spaces as Paying authority will bar him from further work as he has not completed the job as per the specifications. So he first has to make them and then later break them if the need arises. The authorities are clear that since footpaths are not wide enough there should be no hurdles including trees. Garden dept in charge of Aundh Mr. Sonune has planted *Alstonia Scholaris* "Devil Tree" or "*Saptparni*" on slim road divider along Spicer Road. It's been about 4 months now. He is waiting to observe how they fair and accordingly will plan to plant in other dividers too in Aundh. One other tree which has done well is Popular tree on slim road divider in front of Crosswords bookstore on Senapati Bapat Rd. These are about 6 years old.
6. In an effort to improve facilities for pedestrians and cyclists a plan is under way to build a cycle cum footpath along the canal bank road from SNTD to BMCC. This month's docket had a request to cut 14 trees along the stretch from SNTD gate to Athavale Chowk. This is a report on action so far.

As the work progresses along, more trees will need to be cut. It was essential to make sure that no more than necessary are felled. How much this track will actually be used by cyclists, is yet to be seen. The footpath/cycle track is being done by vigilance dept. under direct supervision of Kareer. They are keeping the original width of the footpath. Only minor adjustments. The idea is to get a cycle track going all the way from the SNTD main gate all the way to BMCC road. Though there is no plan on paper!. Mr. Bapat was quite cooperative and wanted to save as many trees as possible. Outcome is that - tree #1 is already gone!! . #2, #3, #4, #5 will not be cut, since adjustments have been made. #7 and #8 will be cut (#7 is just a stump and #8 has grown horizontally). For now #6 and #9a and #9b (two trees have been marked #9, by mistake) will not be cut for now, to see if after finishing the track, if it can fit. Trees #10 to #14 (5 in total) will be cut, to allow the cycle track to go through a clump of trees. #13 is a biggish tree. Other 4 are young and there is a possibility of transplanting. Bapat will inform us when the cutting happens, so that the trees will not all be indiscriminately chopped, due to miscommunication between Vigilance dept. and axeman!

7. Mrs. S. Upadhyay wrote to us saying if we could help her group of senior citizens. We have requested members residing there to come forward and follow it up.

Her letter to our group says -

"University Hill is famous for its beauty and lush green trees at its foothill. On the periphery of the hill trees were planted 15 to 20 years ago by staff and students of Pune University. Next to hill there is a road known as Vaikunth Mehta Institute Rd. Vaikunth Metha Institute authorities have decided to build a high wall at the foot of the hill just to demarcate the boundary from the university though natural demarcation is

already there. To build this wall forty (40) full grown healthy trees were uprooted with a bull dozer one day."

YOUR !dea BILL

"This was reported to garden dept. by the residents of ICS colony and Bosale Nagar. The inspector from dept. visited the site and made his report which said that thirty (30) full grown of various species had been felled unnecessarily and without permission. The perpetrators were to be fined at the rate of Rs 5000/- per tree which amounted to one lac and fifty thousand rupees (1,50,000/-)"

"According to my information till date the fine has not been paid. And perhaps some sort of compromise is being worked out. The reporting citizens want action to be taken and construction of wall be stopped."

On 18th Nov we visited the site and found that construction of the wall was still on, next to the barbed wire. There are number of healthy assorted trees about 5-6 ft in the university side, and have been planted by Mr. Upadhyay and his close friends. They go for walk there every day carrying water bottles for watering. When we later checked with Mr. Jag Jhap of the garden dept. , he said letter asking for fine of Rs 1,50,000/- has been sent. There has been no response from them.

8. On the 18th of Nov, we had a very enlightening tree walk at the empress garden. Thanks to our expert Parag Mahajan, we learned of quite a lot.
9. As reported earlier, the Pune Municipal Commissioner has asked us to come up with some criteria for the selection or the Pune TRee Authority. Though we do not know how serious he is about using it, it would be a good exercise for us. - The Pune Tree Authority consists of 30 members. The first 15 are elected from the general body of the assembly while the remaining also called co-opted members(which are 15 or less) get nominated by the first 15 members. We have to figure out a set of criteria for the nomination of these co-opted members. As per our conversation with the commissioner and some other people, it would be difficult to come up with this criteria for the first fifteen members but it may certainly be possible for these co-opted members who are meant to be experts in botany, ecology etc and are representing NGO's, citizen groups and such.- Maybe we can also take a step ahead and suggest names for the nomination of the co-opted members. A sub-group of members has since been formed to work on this.
10. During the docket activity, there have been positive reports of some reports of pink notices on trees. Though site visits by members were few, we did submit some objections to the Pune Tree Authority.
11. Pune Tree Watch has also received media coverage through this month. Member, Tasneem balasinorwala was also interviewed on Radio Mirchi on the work the basic work being done by Pune tree Watch.



COMMENTS RECEIVED TO DATE ON THE PROPOSED PLAN OF PROTECTED AREAS RESEARCH

Invitation for Planning Meeting on Protected Areas Research, Gustavo Fonseca, 3/8/2006

There is a powerful emerging realization that protected areas are turning out to be an immensely influential concept, now adopted by over 180 nations, and expressed in an area larger than China and Brazil put together. In February of 2004 the parties to the Convention on Biological Diversity decided to embrace a program of work on protected areas. Through this program, nations commit to building and supporting comprehensive, effectively managed, and ecologically representative national and regional systems of protected areas. Perhaps because of the growing understanding of the significant progress made by local, national and international communities in this arena, and the near universality of the concept's adoption, important questions have also been raised in respect to the costs of protected areas to communities, indigenous peoples and governments at various levels.

Over the past several months, with the encouragement of Kenton Miller, a few members of the World Commission on Protected Areas (WCPA), the largest international forum dedicated to establishment and effective management of a world-wide representative network of terrestrial and marine protected areas, began discussing ways to better assess the overall impact of protected areas around the world. One such route could take the form of an analysis that addresses not only the obvious contribution that these sites provide to biodiversity, to ecosystem services and to people everywhere, but also examine the socio- and economic costs that are imposed to different sectors of society in the pursuit of the common good. The latter subject has become a heated topic of discussion in many recent international forums, and the subject of controversial but widely read commentaries in a variety of publications. Common to all these, however, is the general lack of solid data needed to better inform this important debate.

In coordination with the leadership of WCPA, we began exploring the possibility of initiating a study that addresses these gaps. We are thinking about dividing up the initial task along three main tracks:

- 1) Valuation and Economic Benefits of Protected Areas: Compile existing cases containing financial analysis or economic valuation of ecosystem service benefits at protected area sites. These could include one (e.g. carbon or tourism) or more benefits at a site. We would examine the type and level of benefit, the type of study, and who captures the benefits (e.g. local, downstream, regional, national, international). These financial or economic benefits can be compared to management costs when possible.
- 2) Management and Benefit Distribution: Identify studies that describe, in qualitative terms, the benefits received from protected areas, and how these are distributed to people at different scales: some accrue locally, some regionally or nationally, and some at international scales. We would also describe the socioeconomic context of the protected area, and how that is related to management actions, management effectiveness, and benefit distribution.
- 3) "People-Park" Conflicts: Assess the social costs of protected areas. These should focus on issues such as resettlement, limits on use or access to resources, enforcement, inequity, and

7. Mrs. Mala Rihan pointed out that the wood of one tree approximately costs Rs.40,000, and hence there is greater motive to cut trees than to preserve them

What can we do to overcome the roadblocks to Agenda 21 – or pull it out of the mire – and thus arrest the degradation of the global environment and implement the paradigm of sustainable development?

There is no simple answer. A new, ponderous piece of international bureaucracy in the form of a world environment authority or organization is not the answer. We are hardly engaged on the road to sustainable development, and until we have made a lot more real progress such proposals only seem to me to divert attention from the real issues.

The need is to continue the hard slog. Work must continue on the various components of an overall system that will, in time, be fittingly capped by an authority or an organization capable of sustaining the momentum towards sustainable development. There is undoubtedly a need for improved networking among existing institutions. There may be a need for improved mandates, although one should not underestimate the political difficulties of winning agreement to these in the UN system.

Clearly, improved communication must be a big part of the answer. We achieved, at times anyway in the CSD, something approaching a real dialogue, enough to whet the appetite of a number of fellow ministers who were as frustrated as I was with the rigid and stupefying routines that had made the CSD for many a complete non-event. We can also work in other fora to engage the interest of other relevant sectors where there is an obvious disjunction between the environment and other concerns.

A key objective in working on improving communication will be to advance understanding of the link between the environment and development. There are gaps in knowledge and techniques in many sectors about how to manage and develop resources in a sustainable way. Many of these can be overcome by the sharing of information in or through specialized fora. The CSD can and should articulate further the vision of sustainable development adumbrated in Agenda 21, as it progresses through its treatment of sectors and themes.

There is now a strong focus on sustainable development in the OECD and we can expect that organization to devote a good part of its analytical skills to the issue. Will the WTO follow the aspirations of retired head Renato Ruggiero and do the same? The WTO is criticized by non-governmental organizations (NGOs) in particular for being devoted to free trade to the exclusion of all other concerns. Leaving aside for the moment the environmental benefits of free trade objectives such as the elimination of agricultural and fishing subsidies, the WTO itself has had a bad press. A WTO agreement such as the Sanitary and Phytosanitary Agreement is in fact a basic instrument of international environmental protection.

The link needs to be understood and acted on in capitals first and foremost: officials often seem to argue inconsistently in the WTO and environmental fora. There is widespread suspicion that all the talk about the environment is simply aimed at finding new ways of protecting the rich economies from the growing competition coming out of the developing world. If there is to be any hope of major advances in winning global acceptance of a paradigm of sustainable development, we cannot afford the damage caused by ill-judged attempts to load questionable environmental issues on to the WTO agenda. The precautionary principle, which should be restricted to major instances or threats of environmental degradation, may not survive attempts to make it a pretext for any action that is not sustainable under the WTO agreements.

That problem may, in part, be overcome by improved resource governance in countries that lack it. Well-directed, environmentally integrated development assistance will continue to be of importance. I also look forward to a rapid development of the capacity of the GEF to offer capacity-building assistance not just to make basic assessments, but also to allow countries to build up their participation in the response to global environmental problems. New Zealand has pushed for this in the GEF, particularly with regard to its South Pacific neighbours, and has also assisted directly through New Zealand Overseas Development Aid (NZODA), for example with climate change adaptation. More needs to be done to ensure that the big development institutions such as the World Bank integrate sustainability criteria within their development assistance.

I cannot overstate the importance of science, which is the lynch pin. We owe what we know already about the degradation of our natural and physical resources to science. Is it too much to hope that one day science will develop a generally agreed picture, in sufficiently useful detail, of the state of the world environment? Some countries, including New Zealand, have made a start with their own environments. We are also pushing for such a scheme for the globally vital Antarctic environment. UNEP is developing elements of a global scheme through its work.

Building on its solid track record to date, the law can play an important role in ensuring that sustainable development is the new foundation of cooperation in the international community, rather than the cause of terminal strife. This is by way of sound, fair, rules-based systems that promote responsible environmental management and leave less and less room for irresponsibility. I said earlier that I thought that the tools of environmental remediation and sustainable development were not yet well developed. Perhaps the exception is the Montreal Protocol, where there is a broadly coherent framework including an effective interface between science and policy, realistic commitments with flexibility as

On behalf of the inter-commission Theme on Indigenous and Local Communities, Equity and Protected Areas (TILCEPA) of the World Conservation Union, we are writing to express serious concern over recent approaches taken in establishing Mt. Merapi National Park (SK No. 134/MENHUT-II/2004) without giving due consideration to the concerns of indigenous communities in the area.. The some 20,000 local and indigenous persons currently living on the slopes of Mt. Merapi, whose livelihoods, culture and spirituality are integrally and intimately connected to the ecosystems of Mt. Merapi cannot be left out of the process of establishment of the protected area.

We commend you and the Government of Indonesia for wanting to establish the area of Mt. Merapi as a protected area, but this should not be at the expense of these communities' interdependent relationships with the Merapi ecosystems and the sustainable use of its biodiversity. Hence, TILCEPA would respectfully request the Government of Indonesia to clarify its intentions for the indigenous communities of Mt. Merapi and to consider establishing Mt. Merapi as a protected area that fully recognizes and respects the inalienable rights of local and indigenous communities to benefit from, manage and conserve the ecosystems and biodiversity that are important to them.

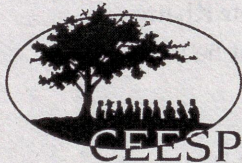
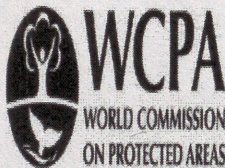
