

Acting upon the recommendation of Professor D. F. Othmer, Head of our Department of Chemical Engineering, I am happy to admit you to the Graduate School of the Polytechnic Institute of Brooklyn for advanced study in the field of Chemical Engineering. This admission is effective for the term beginning approximately September 15, 1947 and continuing for two academic years thereafter.

You should anticipate planning your advanced studies with Professor Othmer after your arrival in the United States. Because of the differences in programs between the University of Allahabad and the Polytechnic Institute of Brooklyn, it will probably be desirable for you to enroll for certain undergraduate courses in Chemical Engineering. I am certain, however, that a combined program can be worked out which, when successfully completed, would enable you to qualify for the degree of Master of Chemical Engineering. It will probably be possible for you to include certain advanced courses in chemistry and physics, if that is your desire.

I am very happy that we are to have at the Polytechnic Institute of Brooklyn a graduate student highly recommended by our good friend Sir K. S. Krishnan. We enjoyed very much his stay with us last year.

You would be well advised to obtain passage to the United States at so early a date that you could be certain of reaching the United States several weeks before the opening of sessions.

The Polytechnic Institute does not have student dormitories. However, we will be happy to give you every possible assistance in finding private rooms in the vicinity. The citizens of Brooklyn have been very generous in their welcome to scholarly visitors from overseas.

We are looking forward with pleasure to having you study in our laboratories for the coming two years.
